A NOTE FROM THE DEAN

The Body of Christ – a diverse source of great encouragement

There is just so much to encourage us within the Church at this time of year. I made the point to one of our suffragan bishops while walking into the second of the bishop's barbecues for ordinands. Bishop Nick and Linda extend generous hospitality to those who are days away from being ordained as deacons or priests around the time of St. Peter's Day, 29th June. This is meant to be an encouragement to them and, for those who have one, their spouses. The encouragement extends also to those of us who, as members of the Bishop's Staff Team, attend to give support. As St. Francis said, it is in giving that we receive!



Bishops, Priests and Deacons

St. Paul famously described the Church as the body of Christ, made up of many varied members, each important and each having a vital contribution to make to the whole.

"Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of services, but the same Lord... If all were a single member, where would the body be?"

Since the earliest days of the Church, it has been accepted that some are called to lead – elders or presbyters, exercising oversight - episcope, episcopal ministry – over the Church. And it soon became obvious as the Church grew that bishops, those exercising oversight, couldn't be everywhere; they would need the support of local priests. And they in turn would require the support of deacons, a type of ministry which had been developed in the first place, according to the Acts of the Apostles, to support the apostles, preventing poor widows from going without basic needs. A structure for ministry developed, therefore, which provided for the necessary

leadership of the Church, its sharing of word and sacraments, teaching and evangelism, and care pastorally for people both spiritually and practically. It was extremely effective, and it still is.

Many new ones!

In recent ordination services we have been reminded of how central the three-fold order of ordained ministry - bishops, priests and deacons - is to us in the Church of England. It has been an essential dimension of our self-understanding for five-hundred years since the Reformation. This is a gift from the past, yes, but it is a divine blessing for the Church and world today. By the Holy Spirit men and women are still detecting a deep sense of God's call to these ministries.

Recently, in York Minster, Archbishop Stephen and other bishops consecrated three new bishops to help lead the Church. Two of them are for this diocese of Leeds; Bishop Smitha Prasadam, Area Bishop of Huddersfield, and Bishop Anna Eltringham, Area Bishop of Ripon. I look forward to installing them in Ripon Cathedral in September - everyone is welcome to join us and share in the celebrations on 17th September at 3.30pm. Please, do pray for them at the beginning for their episcopal ministries, and for Bishop Nick and all the bishops of this diocese, shown below outside York Minster, following the recent consecration.



The ordinations of priests and deacons have been taking place across the diocese, as they have across the whole Church of England in recent days and weeks. The photograph at the beginning of this pastoral letter comes from the ordination of priests by Bishop Nick at Ripon.

Those who are called have their Christian faith in common, but much about them is also very different. Men and women from different backgrounds and with different particular gifts, passions, life experiences, and outlooks are included among them.

We thank God for them all and pray for them as they begin a new significant chapter of discipleship.

Sarah Hobbs has been a member of the cathedral's worshipping community for several years and has served for some time as the PCC secretary. We are delighted that she has been recommended to go forward to train for ordained ministry. NEWS FROM THE MUSIC DEPARTMENT

The choir continues to go from strength to strength with all the children who joined the choir in September having completed their probation and been inducted as full choristers.

The new round of recruitment is underway and at the time of writing Dr Krippner had visited 17 schools and heard 410 children sing in schools. 37 children had parents who responded to the opportunity for a further voice trial at the Cathedral and offers will be made to in due course for children to become probationers.

The end of the year always brings a turnover and this year 4 choristers will leave their role as Choristers having reached the end of Year 8. However we hope to see some of them in the new year as they return as Choral Scholars. We are also saying farewell to Shaun Turnbull as Assistant Organist as he moves on from the Music Department. We will welcome Alastair Stone into that position. Alastair comes to us at the beginning of his music career and eager to gain experience in the world of Cathedral music. He is currently organ scholar at Manchester college Oxford and also plays in local churches. The organ scholar role has also been filled with a young man moving to do A Level Studies at Ripon Grammar School and develop his music skills at the Cathedral.

In May, the Boy Choristers spent the day in York with a visit to the Railway Museum in the morning and then singing Evensong at the Minster with the Lay Clerks and the choir of York Minster. A long day was enjoyed by all.

The Christer Forum has been re-established with reps of the choir talking about what they enjoy and what they think could be improved about their choir experience. The music staff were pleased to hear both boys and girls report, that they felt very safe at the Cathedral.

JOIN the Camino Ingles Durham to Escomb 11-13 September 2023 (JUST A FEW SPACES LEFT) plus Extension to Gainford 14 September 2023 option

We have found a short and official Camino in the spirit of the pilgrim route of St Godric early Celtic saint based from Durham Cathedral to Gainford. Camino Inglés to Finchale- Finchale Priory (via Durham Cathedral) via Escomb Saxon Church – 3 days, 22 miles. Optional extension Escomb to Gainford 11 miles

This route is a recognised English section of the Camino de Santiago, starting at the port city of A Coruna, where medieval pilgrims arrived from England. From the spectacular ruins of Finchale Priory, where the 12th-century hermit Godric lived for 50 years, and from where he made one of the earliest recorded pilgrimages from England to Santiago in Northern Spain. **Official Camino Passports** available at £5.00 from Frances Cole.

Walk the Camino to Durham Cathedral, where the shrines of the Venerable Bede and St Cuthbert are housed, and join if wished the cathedral choir sing evensong.

Walk through the Weardale valley alongside Binchester Roman Fort before reaching Bishop Auckland. Auckland Castle houses paintings of Jacob & his twelve sons by Spanish painter Francisco de Zurburan. <u>https://www.caminoingles.gal/en/finchale-camino-ingles/</u>

The Camino accommodation is based in Ushaw College for three nights with bed & continental breakfast. Dinner is in the College on two nights with either a three or two course option of your choice. Meal arranged locally for third night.

CHURCH OF ENGLAND DIVESTS OF FOSSIL FUELS AS OIL AND GAS FIRMS DITCH CLIMATE PLEDGES

In a significant announcement on Thursday 22^{nd} June, the Church of England said it was divesting from fossil fuels in its £10.3bn endowment fund and its pension fund.

"The climate crisis threatens the planet we live on and people around the world who Jesus Christ calls us to love as our neighbours.

"It is our duty to protect God's creation, and energy companies have a special responsibility to help us achieve the just transition to the low carbon economy we need," said Justin Welby, the archbishop of Canterbury, and the chair of the church commissioners for England.

- 2. Recycle clothes you no longer use. Avoid buying new clothes by buying secondhand clothes and special occasion wear. Buy organic cotton or recycled fabrics wherever possible.
- 3. Avoid plastic by going back to hard soap to wash hands. Handmade soaps make lovely gifts.
- 4. Turn off the cold tap when brushing your teeth to save water.
- 5. 'ERASE YOUR FACE' is a washable cloth to remove make-up.

No other lotion or soap is needed so it is economical and sustainable.

"We cannot live on a planet where billions of people use rapidly diminishing fresh water resources to flush their waste," said curator Arja Renell. "The whole system needs to change," she continued. RIPON CATHEDRAL NET ZERO CARBON 2030 COMMITTEE NEWS

- The NZC 2030 Committee reports that electricity costs have fallen by a third since the installation of LED lights in the Cathedral.
- Three tenders are being considered for external LED spotlights which will lead to further cost savings once they are installed.
- The Committee is studying ways of moving to more sustainable energy.

It was supported by Ripon Community House, Zero Carbon Harrogate Retrofit, Resurrection Bikes, National Trust, RSPB, Ripon Cathedral Eco Action Group, Canal and River Trust, North Yorkshire Citizens Advice, Yorkshire Rewilding Network, The Green House, Ripon Grammar School Eco Club, Long Lands Common, SOME Consulting and Oasis Energy.

This broad selection of environment groups gave the people of Ripon a chance to explore their environmental interests in one place. The link between the outside stalls and the stalls in the beautiful council chamber worked well. It was co-ordinated by RIPON TOGETHER, helped by Little Bird Markets.









Food for Life - *The new science of eating well* by Tim Spector – reviewed by Dorothy Gray

With over five hundred pages of facts and information and footnotes and citations from scientific journals,

It leads us to think that the daily pleasure that is our food and drink is rife with choices and traps for the unwary. There is plenty on the current trend to encourage us away from unhealthy highly processed food.

The author also explores contemporary issues like the future of food and what should we eat to save the planet. There is also a chapter that reviews how storing, processing and cooking alter

food especially with an eye on nutrition. Plenty of food for thought.

In the chapter, "What to eat to save the Planet" we are reminded that if we do not change our habits fast, then by 2050 the Earth will have lost most of its trees and

habitable areas. Furthermore, amid climate chaos we will have run out of food. A 2018 United Nations report estimated that to limit global warning to below 2°, we need to reduce meat eating by 90%. And, at the same time, increase our consumption of protein in beans and legumes fourfold.

Currently in the UK 55% of arable land is used for grazing cattle. The plant crops and water we feed to cattle also make the production of meat inefficient and unsustainable. The author suggests starting with one meat-free day a week and giving up cheap highly processed meat first. A pasture-grazing British cow will produce five times less carbon than its equivalent in Brazil so our choice and source of meat is also important.

This book is recommended to those who want to make informed decisions about food from a health as well as an environmental perspective.

Beware though, you need time to "digest" the whole!

FOOD SUPPORT

Your help is needed to meet ever increasing demand on the City's food banks due to the soaring cost of the weekly shop.

These items are ALWAYS needed:
