

A NOTE FROM THE DEAN

Stick with Love

It sounds like very good advice, to stick with love. It seems welcome in a world which in many areas seems determined to do everything possible to eliminate love as a guiding value and principle. We see it on the world stage. Tragically, war still casts its shadow over Europe and open conflict once more rages in the Holy Land. Stick with love? Perhaps in part the world needs to rediscover love.

It is also sobering that this apparent determination to stamp out love is seen in too many local and national communities, along with undermining many of the other fruits of the Holy Spirit of God (joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control). The love of God, however, offers hope.

The succession of themes and moods which we attend to in the life of the Church over the next couple of months is a reassuring response to all that would prevent life being enjoyed in its fulness. In the end, love will conquer – with all those other spiritual fruits, because God shows that he will stick with love, and he will stick with his fallen, and otherwise hopeless world. In every situation, then, there is hope.

'I have decided to stick with love...'

We are thinking about sticking with love because 'Stick with Love' is the title of the Archbishop of York's Advent Book this year, written by our very own Bishop of Kirkstall, Bishop Arun Arora. At the cathedral, we are inviting everyone to read the book and to come together over three evenings in Advent to discuss it – further information available in this newsletter. Bishop Arun provides daily stories of saints - men and women of God – from a wide spectrum of ages and backgrounds. It reminds us how all-embracing and inclusive the love of God is, and how this can be reflected in the life of his Church.

The book reminds us that Martin Luther King once famously declared, 'I have decided to stick with love... Hate is too great a burden to bear.' What wisdom! From time to time, the love and hope of God become visible when other people, speaking from situations of hurt and injustice, share this same sentiment. We have recent evidence of this from Israel and Gaza. Some media reports of the conflict have enabled us to listen to the voices of ordinary people, from both sides, who simply want to live at peace with all their neighbours, Israelis and Palestinians alike.

Greater love...

In a complex and, sadly, often less-than-perfect world, things are not always so simple. Conflict and wars do happen, and sometimes people are justified in taking up arms to counter an even greater evil. At our time of Remembrance in November, we find ourselves reflecting on how words in St. John's Gospel which originally spoke of Jesus' loving self-sacrifice, resonate with the self-sacrifice of many in recent wars, 'No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends.' (John 15:13)

Jesus was speaking at length with his disciples the evening before his crucifixion. Needless to say, we reflect most on this in the weeks and days leading up to Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. Yet we are bound to be influenced by what Jesus' crucifixion and resurrection reveal to us of the utter dependability of God's love when we look forward to Advent and, in Advent, prepare for Christmas.

Put on the armour of light

Advent, the first season of the Church's year, encourages us to prepare spiritually for Christmas. Like Christmas, it reminds us that God's love leads him to stick with us – so he came to us in that child of Bethlehem, and he will come again when Christ returns as judge. The theme of judgement may seem rather less inviting and more threatening, and yet it is a natural consequence of a truly good and loving God sticking with his creation until it is put to rights.

The theme of light is often used in Advent to make this point, and to encourage us to change to become more like Jesus. The wonderful collect for Advent Sunday puts it like this,

Almighty God, give us grace to cast away the works of darkness and to put on the armour of light, now in the time of this mortal life, in which your Son Jesus Christ came to us in great humility; that on the last day, when he shall come again in his glorious majesty to judge the living and the dead, we may rise to the life immortal; through him who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

We can probably all think of many ways in which we would wish our loving God to change the world to make it more like his kingdom of justice and peace. Perhaps sometimes we find ourselves asking, 'Why doesn't God do something?' The good news is that he will stick with his creation, and with us, until his kingdom comes on earth as it is in heaven. The sobering thing, however, is that it is not only 'the world' which needs to change, it is also us. A willingness to try to become more Christ-like is nothing less than our loving response to the unfailing love of God.

NEWS FROM THE MUSIC DEPARTMENT

As I write, the choir just sung their last service of this half-term. Beginning their two week break gives firstly the opportunity for visiting choirs to join us for worship and secondly the chance to sit back and reflect on all that has been achieved in this last seven weeks. New probationers have settled in; the choristers, both boys and girls, have excelled in their singing; the Lay Clerks have settled in for the new term well with some glorious Lay Clerk only pieces at Evensongs. This half-term has also seen the return of former members of the choir to sing once again with a choir of over 100 at the Saturday Festal Evensong before our Patronal Eucharist in mid-October. That Patronal Festival itself was a remarkable event with both boy and girl choristers singing together in a choir with over 65 in the top line.

Then we find ourselves in the run up to Christmas with the Christmas concert and the two services of 9 Lessons and Carols. Please look out for the posters advertising the Christmas concert which will present a unique opportunity in the Advent/Christmas season to hear the Cathedral choir accompanied by the renowned St Cecilia orchestra. This is an exciting new initiative this year and one that promises not to be forgotten.

Fundraising for the planned summer tour is beginning in earnest and please support any choristers you know should they approach you with requests for sponsorship for any activities. Excitement is certainly growing.

Please continue to pray for the music staff and all in the choir that they may be kept healthy and saved from an overburden of demands.

Pilgrimage and Retreat to Iona

In the spring I wrote about the proposed pilgrimage to and Retreat to Iona. Suggesting that it might take place in May 2024. However the planning has been such that we have had to delay it slightly and it will now take place in September 2024 (21-27 Sept).

lona has an ancient Christian history, with the visit of Columba to lona in 563, when the first monastery was founded and the rebuilding of the Abbey in 1938 by members of what became a new religious community, the *lona Community*. The island was described by George Macleod, the Community's founder as a *'thin place, where only tissue paper separates the material world from the spiritual world'*.

Following extensive research, the option that we are now going with is to stay at Bishop's House, the Scottish Episcopal Church retreat centre between the village where the ferry docks and the Abbey itself. The Centre has been booked for the week entirely for Ripon Cathedral and we will have our own worship as well as being able to participate in much of the worship that the Iona Community hold in the Abbey Church itself. The retreat centre offers accommodation in single or twin bedded rooms but please note that there are no ensuite facilities. We will do our best to accommodate everyone's wishes but it is possible that you may be allocated a bed in a shared room.

The retreat itself is from Saturday 21 Sept to Fri 27 Sept. We are planning to travel in a coach from Ripon to Oban to catch an early afternoon ferry to Mull. We will then catch the service bus across Mull to reach the last ferry of the day from Mull to Iona.




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Children's Church and Little Children's Church



Eco Church 'Balance Sheet' Exhibition at the Annual Review

St Wilfrid's Stars 2023 - Nomination for the Cathedral Eco Group

The Environment and NZC2030 Committee and the Eco Action Group have been nominated for a St Wilfrid Star by Simon Hewitt, director of Ripon Together, to the grateful surprise of the volunteers.

COP 28 will be held in Dubai from 30/11 - 12/12/23

After a year of record-breaking heat and floods, this COP is a Critical Moment for Climate Action

The UN says "this is a critical turning point in our battle against the escalating climate crisis – a moment to take a long, hard look at the state of our planet and chart a better course for the future."

"The global stocktake is an ambition exercise. It's an accountability exercise. It's an acceleration exercise," said UN Climate Change Executive Secretary Simon Stiell. "It's an exercise that is intended to make sure every Party is holding up their end of the bargain, knows where they need to go next and how rapidly they need to move to fulfill the goals of the Paris Agreement."

'Saving Creation' Courses started again in September

The Environment Programme at the Diocese of Leeds runs three levels of courses.

The courses are to educate people who feel they have a mission to help care for creation.

- 1. **Bronze** this is a two hour Zoom course of Eco discipleship for all, to be done in your own time
- Silver this is an 8-week x two hour Zoom Course to give you a deeper understanding and help you be more engaged in Eco work in your church and become a Parish Environment Officer or another active role.



3. **Gold** – this is a 10-month x two hour Zoom Course to equip you to take on a role which will have the 'care of creation' as its primary focus e.g Area Environment Champion or as an important adjunct to work already being done in worship and teaching or community engagement.

The quality of the teaching has been warmly praised by **Ros Swaney, Dorothy Gray** and Loretta Williams.

Ros said "As well as gaining a deeper understanding through the excellent teaching, all of us greatly appreciated the chance to talk to other people about the Eco mission of the church in this time of climate change and biodiversity degradation."

Dorothy said *"We were encouraged to develop our view of a Christian's personal responsibility for responding to climate change and caring for God's world. My course colleagues had largely committed themselves to a "green" lifestyle and living simply prior to the course. 'Camino Ingles': pilgrimage musings after walking from Finchale Priory to Escomb Church



'Camino' means 'Way' or a 'Path'. In Christian circles the word usually refers to the 'Camino Santiago', a number of routes across Western Europe converging on Santiago de Compostela, the traditional focus since medieval times for pilgrimages that end in the city. Legend has it as the burial place of St James the Elder, the first of the 12 disciples of Christ to be martyred. A traditional Camino Ingles route has long connected Santiago with the ports of A Coruna or Ferrol on the coast in North West Spain, where pilgrims from English ports docked. A current initiative, backed by official Spanish Camino authorities, seeks to establish a Camino route through England to the South Coast, where ferry travel will again link it with the established Spanish Camino Ingles routes. The northernmost section in England will go from Finchale Priory (near Durham) to Escomb (near Bishop Auckland), Gainford, Richmond and Ripon, to York.

In September 2023, 12 of us walked the first stages – over 20 miles - from Finchale Priory to Escomb - to explore the emerging route, over 3 days Any good 'Camino' offers an opportunity to distil our experiences of contemporary life, with heightened awareness or reflection on the environments through which we walk, with personal or wider themes. We have been asked how, on this Camino journey, as pilgrims we connected with nature. A number of responses come to mind:

- The routine of walking each day after day after day slowed us down to better align with the PACE of the creator. Observing and tuning in to the rhythms of the natural world enriched our lives.
- A slower pace allowed us all to be more effectively PRESENT in the moment: attending to one another, better able to notice things and respond to the immediate environment – the rustle of wind in the trees, the gurgling of streams and rivers, the voices of children playing, the impact (often quite intrusive) of human technology –cars, planes radios on the everyday personal sound palette. It helped us appreciate the deeper values of seeing, silence, listening, with reflection. Each person will have had their own personal and different perceptions and appreciation of the natural environment.
- We grew in an awareness of being PART of the whole picture around us: the freedom of being an equal, small but valued, part of a global narrative: not needing to be at the centre of the picture as 'king pin', but appreciating being part of a bigger picture which reflects God's presence and creative purposes.
- Knowing ourselves as simply being in God's world and creation induces a deeper PEACE, with a sense of personal wellbeing. As Julian of Norwich expressed it in the 14th century; ""All shall be well, and all shall be well, and all manner of things shall be well".

A good Camino pilgrimage can nurture and encourage a deeper sense of gratitude, with the practices of PRAISE, not only in the life of those making the journey, but also in an awareness of the creation itself reflecting and praising in the presence of God – through sound and birdsong, through growth and beauty, through colour and texture, through odours and aromas, through the interconnectedness and interdependence of everything in the natural world.



Some years ago, a book by Kosuke Koyama carried the title '3 Mile an Hour God'. As this title suggests, we can relate better to a '3 mile an hour God' when we slow down to his pace, a natural and humane pace. If God's love is often experienced as patient and slow, the Camino allowed us to be tuned in better with him. *Rod & Jan Allon-Smith*

PERSONAL CARBON FOOTPRINT CALCULATION



This is where it all starts on the individual level. The WWF Carbon Footprint Tool is easy to use. It reminds you that although you are trying hard, getting to Net Zero Carbon takes strategic thinking and lifestyle changes and investment. In '*Tonnes of CO2*', the average UK carbon footprint is 9.5 compared with the World 6.76 and Africa 1.00.

TIPS FOR A WARMER WINTER

- 1. Make sure you close your curtains when it gets dark to stop heat escaping.
- Get draft proofing to stop losing heat. Professional draught-proofing of windows, doors and blocking cracks in floors and skirting boards can cost around £250, but can save around £50 a year on energy bills. DIY draught proofing can be much cheaper. Installing a chimney draught excluder could save around £25 a year as well. www.energysavingtrust.org.uk/home-energy-efficiency/energy-saving-quickwins
- 3. Make sure your hot water tank is insulated with a thick jacket. It will save you lots of money not to mention reducing your carbon emissions.
- 4. Thick loft insulation is one of the cheapest and easiest ways to save energy and will pay for itself in hardly any time.

A view from the gate

Farming is just completing its busiest three months. Kicked off by the Yorkshire Show, farmers have been reaping the harvest of the previous year's work and celebrating that harvest in the Cathedral with the Yorkshire Agricultural Society at the beginning of October. Combines working in the fields, tractors and trailers holding up traffic, livestock being moved, markets busy with their trade are all activities you may have noticed and all part of rural life at this time of year. It is a moment of change in the seasons and of farmers busy with that change.

Last year the weather worked for them, this year it's been very different. Rainfall above monthly averages has made field work difficult if not impossible. Winter sown crops of oilseed rape, wheat and barley must be sown and established before the weather turns. Land work when soils are too wet damages soil structure and is often self-defeating.

Farmers are becoming much more conscious of the science of soils and of the fungal activity in them that helps crops grow. They are changing their crop rotations, integrating herbal grassland, experimenting with reduced fertilisers and chemicals, producing grass fed beef, lamb and milk, free ranging pigs and chickens. All this is in response to the changing subsidy regime since Brexit coupled with the financial incentives promoted by Defra and to a greater awareness of the wider environmental benefits of 'regenerative agriculture'.

It's an exciting time to be farming and the key is to find the 'sweet spot' in your farm which enables long term sustainability both financially and environmentally. Easier said than done!




