A very warm welcome to Ripon Cathedral as, with christians all around the world, we join in celebrating the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead.

This service of Choral Evensong is a form of worship which is several hundred years old but draws on even older traditions. The who worshipped here when the Cathedral was founded will have sung and prayed an evening service which is intimately related to the service you experience today.

Easter is the foundation of our faith, the feast that tells again the story of the empty tomb and the disciples' early encounters with their risen Lord. Easter asserts that once and for all, Jesus overcame the powers of sin and death and so gives hope and the promise of life to people in every generation.

It is remarkable to think that people have celebrated Christ's resurrection on this site for over thirteen-hundred years. It is clear to see that we come into a Cathedral that has been decorated for this celebration in the most wonderful way. I am extremely grateful to everyone who has helped to prepare this ancient church for Easter, not least the flower arrangers but also those who have prepared the spectacular Easter Garden.

If you are visiting Ripon for Easter, having travelled from another part of the country or world, then please do take our best wishes back to your home community with you. We pray that you have a safe return journey. If, on the other hand, you live locally and don't normally worship with us regularly, please can I encourage you to come back and join us again? The Cathedral has a growing congregation (including online) and details of our Sunday and daily services can be found on the monthly Newsletter and on the website. Children's church takes place during the Sunday 10.30am service. You would be very welcome at any our services.

I hope that you enjoy celebrating Easter with us in this service. You will note that the new Paschal Candle (Easter Candle) for 2024 is already burning. We are fortunate that it has been especially prepared for us during Lent, and it is well worth admiring for its artistry. It was lit for the first time at our service yesterday evening. It now burns brightly, as it will in baptisms and funerals throughout the year, to remind us of the hope we have been given, thanks to the undying faithfulness and love of God.

Old Testament Reading

The hand of the LORD came upon me, and he brought me out by the spirit of the LORD and set me down in the middle of a valley; it was full of bones. He led me all round them; there were very many lying in the valley, and they were very dry. He said to me, 'Mortal, can these bones live?' I answered, 'O Lord God, you know.' Then he said to me, 'Prophesy to these bones, and say to them: O dry bones, hear the word of the LORD. Thus says the Lord God to these bones: I will cause breath to enter you, and you shall live. I will lay sinews on you, and will cause flesh to come upon you, and cover you with skin, and put breath in you, and you shall live; and you shall know that I am the LORD.'

So I prophesied as I had been commanded; and as I prophesied, suddenly there was a noise, a rattling, and the bones came together, bone to its bone. I looked, and there were sinews on them, and flesh had come upon them, and skin had covered them; but there was no breath in them. New Testament Reading

A reading from the Gospel of Luke

Now on that same day two of them were going to a village called Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem, and talking with each other about all these things that had happened. While they were talking and discussing, Jesus himself came near and went with them, but their eyes were kept from recognizing him. And he said to them, 'What are you discussing with each other while you walk along?' They stood still, looking sad. Then one of them, whose name was Cleopas, answered him, 'Are you the only stranger in Jerusalem who does not know the things that have taken place there in these days?' He asked them, 'What things?' They replied, 'The things about Jesus of Nazareth, who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, and how our chief priests and leaders handed him over to be condemned to death and

crucified him. But we had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel. Yes, and besides all this, it is now the third day since these things took place. Moreover, some women of our group astounded us. They were at the tomb early this morning, and when they did not find his body there, they came back and told us that they had indeed seen a vision of angels who said that he was alive. Some of those who were with us went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said; but they did not see him.' Then he said to them, 'Oh, how foolish you are, and how slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have declared! Was it not necessary that the Messiah should suffer these things and then enter into his glory?' Then beginning with Moses and all the prophets, he interpreted to them the things about himself in all the scriptures.

As they came near the village to which they were going, he walked ahead as if he were going on. But they urged him strongly, saying, 'Stay with us, because it is almost evening and the day is now nearly over.' So he went in to stay with them. When he was at the table with them, he took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them. Then their eyes were opened, and they recognized him; and he vanished from their sight. They said to each other, 'Were not our hearts burning within us while he was talking to us on the road, while he was opening the scriptures to us?' That same hour they got up and returned to Jerusalem; and they found the eleven and their companions gathered together. They were saying, 'The Lord has risen indeed, and he has appeared to Simon!' Then they told what had happened on the road, and how he had been made known to them in the breaking of the bread.
