A NOTE FROM THE DEAN

Disproving the cynics and doubters

They are drunk! It won't last! They are deluded and misguided! The Church is dying! God is dead!

These are just some of the confident assertions and accusations of cynics and doubters which have been levelled against the Church from its birth on the very first Day of Pentecost until now, two thousand years later. Yet the Church continues to grow globally, and there are wonderful signs of renewed life, people coming to faith and transformational service, even in the challenging mission field which is western Europe. These signs are clearly seen in the life of Ripon Cathedral and the Diocese of Leeds.

Celebrating Pentecost

According to St. Luke, it all started on the Day of Pentecost. Christ, having been crucified, was raised to new life on that first Easter Day. Forty days later, after appearing to hundreds, he ascended into heaven. And ten days later, on the Jewish festival of Pentecost – 50 days after the Passover and after Jesus' resurrection - the Holy Spirit descended on the disciples in a dramatic and earth-shattering way. It was as if, with a mighty wind, tongues, as of fire, came upon them. They could be understood by people of many nations and languages. No! They were not drunk, as the cynics suggested - see the account in the Acts of the Apostles. The Spirit was reversing the divisive and disabling effect of Babel. Back in the early days of the Old Testament, when people thought they could build heaven on earth in their own strength, they were frustrated by their inability to speak the same language, to understand each other and work together in harmony. Now, with the pouring out of the Holy Spirit, the Church was created to be Christ's instrument of change and transformation.

Two thousand years on from its birth, the Church is now a growing global community, full of life and transforming countless people, communities, and situations for the better. Yes, there are still cynics and doubters, perhaps we sometimes find ourselves amongst the latter. And yes, we do acknowledge that there are sincere people who find the idea of God and the owning of faith impossible, however hard they try. Also, it is well recorded throughout the history of the Church, that there have been countless examples of forces rising to oppose it when Christ's mission flourishes. Yet, thanks to the work of the Holy Spirit, the Church's life is sustained, it is refreshed and renewed in unexpected ways, and it serves the world beyond its own membership, thus furthering God's kingdom. It does not claim to be perfect, far from it, yet since its birth, the Church has been helping the world to become that bit more like heaven than would otherwise be the case.

Services of Celebration

Do join us to celebrate the Feast of Ascension on Thursday, 9th May at 5.30pm, and for the Feast of Pentecost, on Sunday 19th May – especially for the Festal Eucharist at 10.30am and (or) Festal Evensong at 3.30pm. These will be great occasions when, with the glorious and harmonious contribution of the cathedral choir, we will praise God for what he is doing in his Church today, not least in the Diocese of Leeds and through Ripon Cathedral.

The Diocese of Leeds @ 10

The signs of how God is working in his Church in this diocese are being shared and celebrated as we mark the 10th anniversary of the creation of the diocese on Easter Day in 2014.

In April, the Archbishop of York spent a long weekend in the diocese, visiting a wide variety of communities and expressions of Church across its length and breadth. He saw or heard about people coming to faith in all areas of the region; of auction mart chaplaincy in Leyburn, of mission apprentices in Bradford, of young Christians blossoming in Bradley (Huddersfield Episcopal Area), of people from Hong Kong being cared for in Leeds, of great achievements with Eco-Church in Embsay with Eastby, of the provision of sanctuary and support for asylum seekers in Wakefield, of Christianled social action, of prison chaplaincy, of parish churches faithfully serving communities across the whole breadth of the diocese, and of much, much more.

We rightly praise God for all the clergy and people who are part of this diocese and who contribute to its mission. With the archbishop, I want to pay tribute to Bishop Nick who has provided exceptional leadership over the last decade, leading us through the inevitable complexities and challenges which come with the creation of a new diocese – yet more evidence of the Holy Spirit's work amongst us.

More Services of Celebration – don't miss *Rivers of Life* at Ripon Cathedral, 12th May at 3.30pm

All that the Archbishop saw and heard gave substance to the service of celebration at Bradford Cathedral on Saturday, 20th April. There will be another cathedral celebration here at Ripon on Sunday, 12th May at 3.30pm. This is one in which Bishop Anna and I will be leading people from across the diocese in praising God for the myriad ways in which his faithfulness and life-giving love are seen in the rural communities and churches of this region. Please, do see what Canon Wendy has written about the service and the people from the region who will be illustrating how God's goodness is shown well beyond the structures of the Church, in the life of organisations and businesses which serve us all.

Everyone is very welcome to join us for this service. Please, do come along. There will be refreshments served afterwards when we can carry on the sharing of good news stories.

Yet more good news – to be shared at the annual meeting on Monday, 20th May at 7.30pm in Thorpe Prebend House

Yes, the cynics and doubters will be cynical about the prospect of an annual meeting possibly being enlivening and encouraging. And yet this is precisely what we find with the Annual Parochial Church Meeting here at the cathedral in which we have an opportunity to reflect on how God has been working in and though the cathedral community over the last year. It also gives an opportunity to thank those who are contributing so much to all that we are and do, whether it be worship and pastoral care, education visits and welcoming visitors, serving the community through Cathedral Community Connections (C3), developing our Net Carbon Zero agenda and action, supporting our wonderful choir, or raising funds.

Every parish has an Annual Parochial Church Meeting – as I chair those across the cathedral benefice, I hear many encouraging stories of how the Church is active and enriching local communities. Even though the cathedral parish no longer has a PCC, we still need to have our annual meeting, when churchwardens will be elected and people chosen to serve on the Chapter's Growth Committee (the committee which represents our worshipping community and coordinates the mission which it offers to Ripon and the wider region).

So, the focus on 20th May is the life and service of the cathedral's worshipping community. The cathedral, of course, is made up of many communities, all of which contribute invaluably to the advancing of the Chapter's vision and strategy, *Growing God's Kingdom*. The opportunity to hear about the progress across the full breadth of our mission is the meeting at which we launch our annual review. This year, that will take place on Saturday, 14th September at 10.00am in the cathedral, when we also plan to have our Eco Coffee Morning. Please, put that in your diary also.

Ripon Cathedral Renewed – additional consultation

Many thanks to all who contributed to the additional consultation we held through Lent for our development plans. We were keen to share the details with as many people as possible. As the statement on the cathedral website informs us, 77% of those who submitted a response showed support for our plans. We know, of course, that there are those who have questions about what we propose, and there are particular concerns about a veteran beech tree and other trees.

We are now processing the responses, and considering any suggestions which might help us to amend our proposals towards an acceptable compromise. I continue to be grateful to the staff and volunteers who are working hard to move things forward so that the cathedral and city might one day have the facilities which are so essential to the sustainability of the cathedral, the welfare of its choir, volunteers, staff, congregations and many visitors, the flourishing of the city, and our service to the region and diocese.

Still more good news and great opportunities

Celebrating 10 years of rural life in the Diocese of Leeds by Canon Wendy Wilby

These past 10 years have speedily flown by with the Diocese exploring different ways of working in virtually every aspect of its life. One of the challenges has been having three cathedrals serving one Diocese, when, let's face it, the norm has always been one cathedral! It has encouraged our cathedrals to recognise that, after all, they don't have to be all things to all people all of the time. To that end, as ministry has come into focus, Ripon Cathedral and indeed the Ripon Area quite clearly has been called to serve the vast rural community of North Yorkshire with all its joys and concerns. It seems appropriate that, when we take stock and give thanks for the past 10 years, the service for celebrating Rural Life in the Diocese of Leeds is hosted in Ripon Cathedral.

Called <u>Rivers of Life</u>, the service will draw people together from across the diocese thanking God for all those who contribute to, and support rural community, farming and rural business. We will focus on four major areas. Firstly, we will reflect on the huge importance of water in the dales and moors with our fast-flowing rivers and reservoirs, not to mention the problems of increased flooding and water-logged land. We have invited Simon Warwick MBE of the Lower Ure Conservation Trust to share his experience with us.

Secondly, farming and food production in this new Brexit age. John Dawson, whose family farms the slopes of Ingleborough, will give us hands-on information as they face all the challenges of contributing to feeding the country.

Thirdly, visitors and hospitality, a fast-growing area as we welcome more and more tourists both from this country and abroad to visit our stunning countryside and historic sites. Justin Scully, General Manager at Fountains Abbey, National Trust, will talk about this renowned World Heritage site.

Finally, the Rt Rev Anna Eltringham, Bishop of Ripon, will be sharing what she has discovered about community life and community spirit in her first year of episcopal ministry whilst she has travelled around North Yorkshire. Community is central to our ministry as Christians where individuals are to be valued and loved for what they are, the children of God, and where sometimes, as acting as places of Sanctuary, we have made room in our homes and hearts for refugees from war torn countries.

In all these areas we see the work of our Creator God unfolding, and in these past 10 years it has been our task to join in with that work and contribute to the bringing in of God's Kingdom.

Do come and join us at the service, you are most welcome!

NEWS FROM THE MUSIC DEPARTMENT

What a wonderful Holy Week and Easter we had at the Cathedral this year. The Lay Clerks, swelled by many deps who came to help out, alongside the girl and boy choristers and all the choral scholars enhanced the worship of the cathedral so wonderfully. I know many messages of thanks and appreciation have been passed to the Cathedral, and it is only right we the music staff hear those messages and understand how much their hard work is appreciated.

The new term has begun with rounds of recruitment taking place with around 30 schools being approached to see if there are any potential new choristers are willing to get on board and to work hard to reach their potential as Cathedral choristers. The net has been cast a little wider again this year with schools in Wetherby and North Harrogate approached.

Once term has finished though, the excitement for the tour Bavaria will really bubble over. A tour party of 50, with 37 choristers and lay clerks and staff will fly from Manchester to Munich at the end of July to perform in both concert and liturgical settings.

Please continue to pray for all the staff of the music department as they continue their work of developing a choir that enables so many to encounter God through music!

D-Day Lectures in the Cathedral

Given by Lieutenant Colonel the Revd Nicholas Mercer

Tuesday 21st May 7.30pm *Just War Theory and the Law of the Conduct of War*

Tuesday 28th May 7.30pm Establishing and Maintaining Peace – the International Rules Based System

Ripon Cathedral's D-Day Lectures are on Tuesday 21st May and Tuesday 28th May 2024 at 7.30pm in the Quire. They will be given by Lieutenant Colonel the Revd Nicholas Mercer. The first, on the 21st, is about Just War Theory and the Law of the Conduct of War. The second one, on the 28th, is about Establishing and Maintaining Peace – the International Rules Based System.

The Canon Chancellor of Ripon, Canon Matthew Pollard said, "2024 marks the 80th anniversary of the D-Day Landings. They were the beginning of the end of the Second World War. We owe a debt of gratitude to those who served there in order to liberate Europe from the threat of tyranny. We are also indebted to those who established systems of international rules which – however imperfectly – have helped maintain relative peace in Europe for over 75 years since those dark days of 1944 and 1945. Nicholas Mercer is a powerful and compelling speaker. He has been there and done it – a practising Christian Military Lawyer who found himself in the thick of war. He speaks from first hand experience of how wars begin and are conducted, and of the pressures on the mechanisms which are meant to ensure peace."

Lieutenant Colonel the Revd Nicholas Mercer. Educated at St Andrews and Oxford University. He was admitted as a solicitor in 1990 and subsequently commissioned into the Army Legal Service 1991. He served in Northern Ireland, Bosnia Herzegovina, Cyprus and Germany and was the Command Legal Adviser for the HQ 1st (UK) Armoured Division during the Iraq War 2003. Ordained 2011 and named Liberty Human Rights Lawyer of the Year 2011-2012 for "integrity and courage in the face of the dissembling and denial of human rights abuses in Iraq 2003". Trustee of Redress 2011-2022 and member of Liberty Executive Committee and Policy Council. Formerly Rector of the Falkland Islands, South Georgia and British Antarctica, he has been Rector of Bolton Abbey, North Yorkshire since 2019.



GROWING GREENER – RIPON CATHEDRAL ENVIRONMENT NEWS

EARTH DAY 2024 - Theme PLANET vs PLASTICS



Since 1970, Earth Day, on 22nd April, has been a reminder of the urgent need for greater environmental awareness and climate action. Globally about 400 million metric tons of plastic waste is generated annually.

Nearly 36% of this is used in packaging, including single use products for food and drinks, and about 85% ends up in landfill. Plastic is a very useful material but it takes hundreds of years to degrade. It

comes from fossil fuel and must be produced and used responsibly, following a circular economic model.









CRUCIAL UN GLOBAL PLASTIC TREATY TALKS

On April 22nd, 175 countries, including the UK, are coming together for the fourth time in Ottawa to thrash out details of a global treaty that could end plastic pollution, by drastically reducing single use plastic and improving re-cycling in poorer countries. We do our best to reduce and recycle plastic but plastic pollution is forecast to triple by 2040. It is time for governments, big brands and supermarkets to take responsibility and agree a strong GLOBAL PLASTICS TREATY by the end of 2024.

3. Caring for the Environment in the Diocese of Leeds

The Environment Officer at the Diocese is Jemima Parker. She has established a network of volunteer Area Environment Champions in the Deaneries.

4. Working towards NZC 2030 at Ripon Cathedral

1. At the end of 2022, the Cathedral lightbulbs changed to LED, and a green electricity contract was signed. It is hoped to change to low energy external spotlights soon.

- 2. The Environment and NZC 2030 Committee has concluded that ground source heat pumps are not possible because of Ripon geology. It is currently researching solar panels.
- 3. The Committee would like to reduce paper and printing costs. Chester Cathedral saved £30K by various measures.

CONSERVATION AREA

Ripon Cathedral is surrounded by a wonderful green space. It is cared for by Tim Lee and his assistant, Emily. One aspect of their work is on the south side, where they manage the graves and have helped the cyclamen under the copper beech to spread into a stunning carpet.



Ros Swaney met Tim and Emily to discuss the care of the Conservation Area.

This area has naturalised into a spring garden. It starts with snow drops and celandine. Then cowslips, primroses and violets appear. There are some large clumps of blue bells,

before the cow parsley takes over and also the cleavers. There are brambles along the wall and this provides protection for hedgehogs and other small mammals. The dominant cow parsley is a valuable pollinator. Paths could be mown through the area but dog walkers who do not clean up after their dogs make this problematic.

THE JOYFUL SINGING OF THE CLIMATE CHOIR MOVEMENT



Founded in Bristol in 2022, as the 'moderate voice of protest', there are now 11 Climate Choirs in England and 1 in Swansea.
