

A NOTE FROM THE DEAN

What does the Lord your God require of you?

This is never a bad question to ask ourselves; what does the Lord your God require of you? As September calls some of us back into gear after the delights of a relaxing summer, possibly with family and friends, we might be tempted to ask questions about our usual routine and the priorities in our lives. How do we work out what they should be? Well, for those of us with faith, this question is always relevant; what does the Lord your God require of you?

Of course, for those who are not returning to work or school, it may be that September brings a well-earned rest following a summer of looking after grandchildren. The Lord your God may well be requiring you to enjoy that rest, as well as counting the blessings of family.

As a brief aside, I was delighted that the cathedral's Development Department answered that question, whether consciously or not, by organising a beer festival in the Dean's Garden to welcome me and my family home from our holidays. Many thanks to all who helped them make it such a great success – a happy day of fellowship for all ages. It reminded me that Jesus did promise that heaven will be like a great banquet or party. After a summer in which we have seen civil unrest and an increase in conflict in too many places, this was welcome.

Sadly, over the summer, the nation did witness many shameful acts of rioting. The criminal justice system has been doing its best to bring guilty parties to justice – we must pray for all involved. The question, 'What does the Lord your God require of you?' is bound to be relevant for us as a national community as we analyse the causes of the riots and seek how to strengthen the justice and peace for which God longs and which Jesus demonstrated. Many of us believe strongly that no nation is better for forgetting God and what he requires of it.

Don't take God's blessings for granted

The question, 'What does God require of you?' was put to the people of Israel by Moses on the eve of their entry into the promised land. The Book of Deuteronomy in the Bible tells us all about it.

Moses was reminding the Israelites, God's chosen people, that it was by God's grace that they had been led from slavery in Egypt to take possession of a rich and fertile land. They had been led for forty years through the wilderness to bring them to this point. They were not to fall into the trap of thinking the land was theirs by right, or because they were better or more able than other peoples about them. And the warning was clear, if they failed to show gratitude to God and to keep his laws, then they would lose the land (see, for example, Deuteronomy 11:8 – 17).

Thank God for the harvest: Sunday, 6th October 10.30am with the Yorkshire Agricultural Society (YAS)

Later in Deuteronomy (chapter 26), Moses charges Israel to take the first part of their harvest, put it in a basket and present it to the priest as an offering to God. This is to show, each year, that they have not forgotten that their blessings come from God,

and that by working with him in caring for the natural environment and in producing crops their needs are met and their long-term sustainability secured.

As you can read in the pages of this Newsletter, we are doing much at the cathedral over the coming weeks to show that we have not forgotten this ancient lesson of Moses, and that we encourage the wider community to heed it today. Our Harvest Thanksgiving is always a wonderful occasion, this will be especially so this year as we are joined again at the 10.30am service on Sunday 6th October by the Yorkshire Agricultural Society. I am delighted that the Revd Richard Andrew, Chair of the Darlington Methodist District, has accepted my invitation to preach.

Harvest Thanksgiving is good for us spiritually, we are prompted to count blessings and show gratitude. It is good for the community. Like the Book of Deuteronomy, it contains a strong theme of social responsibility – an encouragement to care for those with needs, the outcasts and sojourners (foreign visitors), and those less fortunate. It is good then that our Harvest Supper will raise funds for Christan Aid, an effective aid agency; and we are encouraged to bring harvest gifts on 6th October as expressions of gratitude to God and practical support for the food bank and those who call upon it.

Growing God's Kingdom – launching the Ripon Cathedral Annual Review 2023-2024; Saturday 14 September from 10.00am.

Moses was keen that Israel should remain faithful to God because they were God's plan for restoring humanity and the world to the perfect order which he had intended in the first place. By being faithful to God, Israel would not only enjoy a better life for its own people but would be the means by which all people became faithful to God and thereby enjoy fulness of life.

The long narrative of the Bible reveals how, in the end, he had to send his Son to show what truly faithful living looks like, and to open the possibility of fulness of life for all. Jesus brought teaching and healing to illustrate what heavenly life on earth might look like, and left his Church to work and pray for it. What does the Lord your God require of you? To have faith in Jesus, to follow his example in ways that are appropriate for the world today, and to pray as he taught, 'Thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven...'.

This is why we call the cathedral's vision and mission strategy, *Growing God's Kingdom*. We seek in faith, together, to help the Church and the world become more like God's kingdom. As we launch this year's Annual Review, it is thrilling to reflect on just how many people are engaged with this and the progress being made in so many of our mission areas. Please, do join us on Saturday 14th September as members of the Chapter join me in sharing some of this good news with you. I'm grateful to the Eco Group for providing refreshments that morning, as well as an opportunity to reflect on the Eco Exhibition – another example of how we are heeding the prompting of Moses during these coming weeks.

Exhibition - Eco Award Churches, 2 - 29 September

These weeks of September, weeks of harvest and thanksgiving, are often now used to reflect on God's gift of creation and to encourage our care of the environment. As in Moses's instruction to Israel, we are reminded that all creation is a gift from God.

When asking what God requires of us, we are reminded that within the Bible's account of creation, it is clear that men and women are intended to be good stewards of the natural order.

This theme of good stewardship has become related to the urgent need to respond to the threat to human life of climate change. This is perfectly understandable. As with harvest, however, our first spiritual motivation can be one of faithfully counting blessings and demonstrating gratitude, rather than panic and fear. In the same way, we do not turn the created order into a false god, and we are not called to worship trees or other God-given blessings as idols. Hope comes from understanding the planet and all its occupants as the remarkable gift of God, and looking to Christ to understand our human place within that. Again, we look to Jesus to help us answer the question, 'What does the Lord your God require of you?

The free exhibition which you can find in the cathedral from 2nd to 29th September illustrates how a number of churches in our diocese are faithfully seeking to respond to the threat of climate change and the opportunities to care for the environment. Please, do come and see it.

Patronal celebrations: St. Wilfrid's Banquet, the Choir Alumni, Patronal Eucharist

October brings St. Wilfrid's Day (Saturday 12th) and prompts us to celebrate the remarkable achievements of one of our two patron saints. Wilfrid was a great 7th century missionary bishop who had a wonderful vision for Ripon and built boldly to strengthen the church and further Christ's kingdom. As the Church has routinely found when bringing the good news of Christ to the world, Wilfrid met with opposition. In this place where he built his great basilica, dedicated to the Apostle St. Peter who gave his life for Christ, we continue to benefit from Wilfrid's clear vision and unwavering conviction. He inspires us still, and so we do well to celebrate.

Please, do see all the notices about the St. Wilfrid's Banquet on 11th October, the Patronal Evensong with the choir and its alumni on Saturday 12th at 5.30pm, and the Patronal Euchairst on Sunday 13th at 10.30am. As we seek to further God's kingdom, we do well to thank God for Wilfrid and all our benefactors in this and previous ages.

NEWS FROM THE MUSIC DEPARTMENT

Media coverage, on social media, newspapers and TV means that many people heard about the wonderfully successful choir tour to Bavaria. 44 singers gave of their best in 4 services and 2 concerts over 4 days in Regensberg, Nuremburg, Munich and Waldsassen. Applause at the end of worship and a 2 minute standing ovation after the Waldsassen basilica concert were thoroughly justified.

As the choristers stepped off the bus onto the forecourt of Ripon Cathedral, parents gave them one final standing ovation. There were all thoroughly merited.

And so, after a summer break, the music department returns to prepare for the remembrance season, Advent and Christmas and of course Sunday Eucharists and daily Evensongs. In Waldsassen, people paid €27 (£23) a ticket to hear the choir sing. In Ripon they sing six services a week! And you can hear them for free, and boy are they worth listening to!

At the beginning of this academic year, we welcome around 15 new members of choir including a new Tenor Lay Clerk, Alto and Tenor Choral Scholars and in the top line around 12 new probationers who have been invited, after voice test, to see if becoming a Ripon Cathedral chorister is for them! Please make them and their families feel welcome and a part of the Cathedral community.




GROWING GREENER – RIPON CATHEDRAL ENVIRONMENT NEWS











HOW DID THE 'ECO CHURCH AWARDS IN THE DIOCESE OF LEEDS' EXHIBITION COME TO BE HELD IN RIPON CATHEDRAL?

St. Mary the Virgin, Embsay with Eastby, near Skipton, is the first GOLD ECO CHURCH in the Diocese of Leeds. Dean John visited St Mary's in November 2023 and was so impressed by their vision and achievements that he invited them to spread the message wider, by putting up a display in the Cathedral. And, GOLD ECO CHURCH, Summerbridge Methodist Church, agreed to take part in the exhibition. Canon Matthew took up the challenge and enlarged this idea so that it showcases churches

at SILVER and BRONZE level as well. For good measure, he invited SILVER ECO CHURCH, Bradford Cathedral as well. Ros Swaney worked with Jemima Parker, the Diocesan Environment Officer, and ten churches and two cathedrals have completed case studies of their Eco Church Award journey, which will also be on display.

Diana Linford, Embsay's Parish Environment Officer, said: "We see our Eco Church journey as one of small steps and we are keen to encourage other churches and individuals to start making small changes which really can make a difference.

ECO ACTIONS BY THE VERGER TEAM IN RIPON CATHEDRAL

The verger team actively works with other departments to reduce, reuse and recycle whenever possible. All paper, glass and plastic is carefully separated from general waste and recycled. Where we are able, we use ethically and environmentally friendly products in the cathedral.

Charles Farris, the church supplier we use for our candles, has launched their candle recycling scheme. All plastic, metal and wax candles supplies will now be recycled using their specialised scheme.

Between 2021-2022 our head verger, Charlie Brown, swapped all our lighting over from standard incandescent, or halogen light bulbs, to LED (light-emitting diode). Since the big switch, we are saving 11,000 kilowatt hours of electricity per financial quarter.

The welcomer replied - 'No, I'm sorry, I don't think it is. But we take Eco Church very seriously at Ripon Cathedral'.

Dorothy says 'we have been surprised by your generosity and the donations exceeded all expectations.' There are benefits to reviewing one's wardrobe of accessories – some doners found money or similar in their handbags. We researched online and in local charity shops to get an idea of fair pricing. Wendy Richardson, Janet, Elaine and Dorothy spent a fun evening sorting and pricing the goods.

We were glad that the day of the stall dawned fine and stayed dry and thrilled to raise £372 for Christian Aid. The money raised will go the Christian Aid Harvest campaign. The campaign is helping farmer overseas push back against poverty and climate change, which affects their crops and harvest.

This is not the end of the story though. We are selling some of the designer (Osprey, Aspinall etc) bags through 'Vinted'. Janet has asked a local jeweller to value any hallmarked or striking jewellery. If you know of any local opportunities for us to do a tabletop sale or similar, please let us know.


The Green Fair, organised by the Environment Group of Ripon Together, aims to bring environmental groups together to share information about their environmental projects with the public.

Diocesan Eco-exhibition in the Cathedral

During the month of September, the Cathedral is pleased to be hosting an exhibition showcasing what parishes from across the Diocese of Leeds are doing to journey towards being carbon net zero. A Rocha is the organisation which accredits churches with bronze, silver or golds awards for their eco-activity. The Ripon Bible Exhibition and Lecture Series 8th, 15th and 22nd October

Did you know that Ripon Cathedral owns an internationally renowned collection of mediaeval manuscripts and early printed books? They are housed in the Brotherton Library at the University of Leeds for safe keeping. Among them is a Bible dating back to the year 1260, known as the Ripon Bible. During the month of October there will be a lavishly illustrated exhibition about this rare and beautifully illuminated book in the Cathedral north aisle. There will be a parallel exhibition of illuminated lettering created by pupils from local schools.

This will be accompanied by a series of three lectures about the Ripon collection. On Tuesday 8th and Tuesday 22nd October Dr Carol Ballard will give two different illustrated talks about the Ripon Bible. On Tuesday 15th October Dr Christopher Tinmouth will give an illustrated talk on his research into other areas of this significant collection of rare documents. The lectures begin at 7.30pm. Wine or soft drinks will be available.

In our C3 partnership with Refugee Council an Afghan Afternoon Tea was held within the Cathedral on Sat 20th July from 1:30-3pm.

Afghan families provided a sumptuous array of Afghan desserts and served green tea; it was delightful. They wished to thank everyone for the support over the last few months since their arrival in Ripon. It was amazing to see families looking so relaxed and happy; sharing with the wider community. Many tea party guests enquired if an Afghani recipe booklet could be created so they could produce such lovely treats themselves.



Safeguarding Awareness - Working with Children and Vulnerable Adults. Thurs 17th Oct 24 - 10am to 1pm with lunch.

This course is an introductory session raising awareness of safeguarding when working with children, young people and vulnerable adults.

We look at some key legalisation and guidance associated with safeguarding.

Identify signs and symptoms of abuse and explore what to do if you have a concern about a child, young person or adult. This training should satisfy employer requirements for front line workers who are not a Designated Safeguarding Lead.

Mental Health Awareness. Thurs 28th Nov 24 - 10am to 1pm with lunch.

This course aims to raise awareness of mental health. We explore how to understand and recognise the causes & symptoms of poor mental health and how you can support others in your workplace or community.

Working with Young People. Thurs 27th Feb 25 - 10am to 1pm with lunch.

This course provides basic skills in engaging and communicating effectively with young people. We explore the skills and qualities needed when responding to young people. We use practical information, tips and resources to increase confidence and establish appropriate boundaries for building positive and effective relationships when working with young people.

This work is funded by a Ripon City Council Partnership Grant. All courses are free and are for local partners and community members in Ripon. Training will take place in person in a Ripon venue.




