

# Thank you to all our stars as we step into November and December

The Ripon Together St. Wilfrid's Stars Awards Ceremony took place in the cathedral in late October. This annual ceremony started as a partnership between Ripon Together and the cathedral in our 1350<sup>th</sup> anniversary year. The star, featuring in the crest of St. Wilfrid, came to be used as a symbol for those wonderful people and organisations which, in exceptional ways, make a positive difference to the life of this cathedral city.

As chair of Ripon Together, it was my privilege and joy to preside over what has now become an annual fixture in both the city and cathedral's calendars. Almost 300 people gathered for the free event, including a buffet, musical

entertainment 6<sup>th</sup> Form students of Ripon Grammar School and the All For One Choir, as well as the presentation of awards. This year, the ceremony also included the launch of the Historical Map of Ripon – available in the cathedral shop, The Little Ripon Bookshop, and the library.

Nominations came from, and awards went to, a broad spectrum of the city's community. All those nominated were celebrated by featuring in an exhibition in the cathedral, a good number were mentioned 'in dispatches' during the presentations, and some very deserving people won the awards. Their star-shaped trophies are made by our friends at Jennyruth Workshop.

Among the winners, I am delighted to report, were Dr Krippner - nominated by the chorister parents for his brilliant contribution to the young people of the area by his expert and enthusiastic leadership of the cathedral choir – and the cathedral's guides and welcomers, nominated by a local resident for their contribution to tourism in the city.

As we anticipate a couple of very busy months at the cathedral, this prompts me to celebrate all the stars who are the staff, volunteers and clergy who enable us to serve the city, diocese and region in many, many ways. The daily ministry of worship and prayer continues – always at the heart of the cathedral's life – as do baptisms, weddings and funerals, pastoral care, administration, safeguarding, development, fundraising, and governance, as we also host and lead special services and events for All Soulstide memorials, Remembrance, the cathedral's Christmas Fair, the Advent Carol Service, school Christmas services and concerts, the cathedral choir' concert with St. Cecilia's Orchestra, all the festal services of Christmas, the Boxing Day Pilgrimage to Fountains Abbey and the Watchnight Service. We couldn't do any of this without God's grace and 'the stars' who make up the community of communities which are this cathedral. Many thanks, then, in anticipation for all that you will be doing over the coming months.

### Saying goodbye to Canon Claire

Sadly, Canon Claire, our Canon Pastor, will be leaving the cathedral at the end of November after a relatively short time with us. The needs of family over coming years have led her and Steve, her husband, to conclude it would be wise for her to step back from full-time ministry for a while. We will miss her.

Since arriving in Spring last year, Claire has overseen pastoral care and the creation of the new Growth Committee – an innovation following the implementation of the 2021 Cathedrals Measure and the resultant dissolution of our PCC. She has also been the chapter lead on safeguarding at a time when we have begun preparations for the next audit of our safeguarding of children and vulnerable adults. This is a hugely important area of our mission, not least when we see the choir thriving in remarkable ways. Claire has spent much time attending to the detail of our processes.

Claire's last Sunday as Canon Pastor will be Sunday, 24<sup>th</sup> November, the feast of Christ the King. Following the 10.30am Festal Eucharist, we will have the opportunity to thank her for what she has done and to wish her, Steve and their family every blessing for the future.

### Our new Chief Operating Officer joins us in December

I was delighted to announce in the last week of October the appointment of Carol Pyrah as our next Chief Operating Officer. The Chief Operating Officer works closely with me to facilitate the good governance of the cathedral and oversee effective operations. The role includes that of Chapter Clerk (think of the Cabinet Secretary perhaps!) and membership of the Senior Management Team (also including the dean as chair, residentiary canons, Chief Finance Officer, and Director of Development).

For the last two years, Carol has been Chief Executive at Urban Green Newcastle, a pioneering charity set up to look after the city's parks and allotments. Prior to that, she was Executive Director of Historic Coventry Trust, finding innovative ways to sustain historic places and to inspire, involve and connect people with the city's history. An archaeologist by training, Carol had a senior career at English Heritage and Historic England, where she was a member of the Executive Team and Regional Director for the North East. Churches and cathedrals have been strong themes throughout her career. She was a member of the Cathedrals Fabric Commission for England for 10 years, and is a former Trustee of the Churches Conservation Trust. Carol is currently a Trustee of the National Lottery Heritage Fund and chairs its North Committee.

All those at the heart of the cathedral's governance and operations are delighted that Carol is joining us in early December. She comes with a wealth of relevant knowledge, experience and wisdom that will serve the cathedral well as we continue to progress in line with our strategic vision, *Growing God's Kingdom*.

Chief among those who will be pleased to see Carol arrive is Anne Groves, our brilliant Chief Finance Officer who has also been serving as Acting Chief Operating Officer during the vacancy. She deserves the well-deserved gratitude of the whole cathedral community. The dean is certainly grateful to her!

# Advent – an important opportunity to put ourselves right with God and each other as we prepare for the festive season

Advent is a great season within the Church's year. It has some wonderful hymns and speaks clearly about the period in history in which we live – we are already assured of salvation through Jesus Christ, but the world is yet to be transformed into God's kingdom. Like Lent, it is a penitential season before a major festival in which we are encouraged to reflect on how we live, and put ourselves right with God and each other.

The problem for poor Advent, trying to provide us with this heaven-sent opportunity for personal transformation and preparation, is that it gets taken over with Christmas arriving early. This is seen as clearly in the cathedral as anywhere. We have our Christmas Fair in late November and from that point, a majority of days in the run up to 25<sup>th</sup> December include at least one Christmas carol service, concert or rehearsal. Even so, there is spiritual benefit in trying to 'tune into' Advent.

Advent Sunday gives us the opportunity to start the season well, both in the Euchairst and the glorious Advent Carol Service at 5.30pm. With the choir and music staff giving an inspiring lead, and lighting arrangements providing atmosphere and theological messaging (speaking of the light of Christ coming progressively into the world), and the readings from the Old Testament and the New Testament, we are privileged to share in a rich and profound liturgy.

This Advent age in which we live is clearly far from perfect. The lamentable catalogue of woes in the world, the tragic levels of suffering experienced by humanity and nature, and our own challenges and trials, provide an abundance of evidence that things are not as they should be, and sin is still all too evident. But the message of Advent is that, while being honest about the nature and reality of things, we do believe that God in Christ has already assured us that, in the End, things will be put to right. Christ has already conquered sin and death, and we are promised that one day he will reign over all things in heaven and earth. This is the hope which Advent proclaims and longs for people to heed. It is the hope that gives substance and depth to our Christmas celebrations.

Charles Wesley captured this well in what is now one of the greatest of the Church's Advent hymns:

Lo! He comes with clouds descending, once for favoured sinners slain; thousand thousand saints attending swell the triumph of his train: Alleluia! God appears on earth to reign.	Every eye shall now behold him robed in dreadful majesty; those who set at nought and sold him, pierced and nailed him to the tree, deeply wailing, shall the true Messiah see.
Those dear tokens of his passion still his dazzling body bears, cause of endless exultation to his ransomed worshipers. With what rapture, gaze we on those glorious scars!	Yea, Amen! let all adore thee, high on thine eternal throne; Savior, take the power and glory: claim the kingdom for thine own. O come quickly! Alleluia! Come, Lord, come!

Perhaps we could try to take advantage of Advent, not only by attending the Advent services in the cathedral, but also meditating on this hymn. Verses 2 and 3 might prompt us to pray for the parts of the world where sin and human failing wound both Christ and God's children today. Perhaps they also help us to consider how we personally need to change to enable Christ to reign in our lives and his world. And verses 1 and 4 might just help us to take confidence in the Christan hope and expectation that Christ will one day claim the kingdom for his own.

## **Ripon Cathedral Renewed**

Living in hope and expectation applies to our development project, Ripon Cathedral Renewed. Perhaps this observation raises a smile, I hope so, but it is also a serious point. How could it be otherwise for a community of faith striving to follow God's call and serve his people and world – to make it a bit more like Christ's kingdom for which we pray, work and long?

The additional period of consultation early this year gave us an opportunity to share the facts about our proposals with those who had either not heard about them or who had been confused by some messages within social media, some of which were picked up by the traditional media. That consultation was extremely encouraged, indicating that 77% of those responding to our invitation to comment were in favour of our original plans for a development in Minster Gardens, to the north of the cathedral.

Even so, Chapter and I were keen to listen to all the concerns shared with us, especially about the beech tree which, around the time we submitted our plans, was redesignated as having veteran status. Keen to compromise where possible, while still providing the facilities which will enhance both cathedral and city, we instructed our executive committee to draft amended plans. This they did with remarkable goodwill and effectiveness. Their amended proposals, worked up over several months after the consultation period, have subsequently won the support of key regulators – the Fabric Advisory Committee, Historic England and the Cathedrals Fabric Commission for England. In the light of this significant achievement, Chapter agreed to the revised plans and supporting papers being submitted to the planning officers. An exhibition, showing the details of the revised plans, will be available for viewing in the Cathedral from early November. Our hope is that these will attract even more support than our original proposal. Please, do take time to have a look at them, or see the details on the North Yorkshire Council planners' portal.

# Confirmation 2025

Every year we offer the Children and Young People (in Year 6 or above) and adults who worship regularly at the Cathedral, the opportunity to be 'Confirmed'.

Confirmation takes place in a service in which you re-affirm before a bishop and in front of the congregation the promises that were made, on your behalf by your parents and Godparents at your baptism if you were baptized as a child. If you have not yet been baptized then we can baptize and confirm in the same service. In the service you are asked, by a Bishop, if you would like to commit yourself to be a follower of Jesus and seek to grow in the Christian faith.

This is most appropriate, if you are in Year 6 or above at school and want to be a member of the Church of England. Once 'Confirmed', you will be like a full member of the church and are able to share in the bread and wine of Communion. # **Festival of Lessons and Carols**

Our celebrations of Christmas once again include the traditional Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols at 5.30pm on Mon 23<sup>rd</sup> Dec and Tues 24<sup>th</sup> Dec. These two services have become increasingly popular in recent years, so much so that we are now having to ensure that the number of those attending does not exceed the limit which is safe for the cathedral. We are therefore introducing a ticket system, to ensure we keep everyone as safe as possible. The tickets, of course, are free for these acts of worship.

Early in November, Chapter's invited guests will receive their invitations. They are asked to respond as early as possible, and no later than Monday 9<sup>th</sup> Dec. All other tickets will be available online from 10am on Monday, 2<sup>nd</sup> December.

On each evening, there will be a restricted number of places in the quire and neighbouring chapels for those who turn up before the services. These do not require a ticket, but once the maximum capacity is reached, sadly, we will be unable to allow others to enter the cathedral.

The doors will open at 4.00pm.

# NEWS FROM THE EDUCATION DEPARTMENT

We would like to share that we are celebrating **tripling our school visitors this Autumn Term with 480 pupils** visiting the cathedral for workshops. Now about 2000 pupils attend workshops throughout the year. Canon Matthew and I are very grateful to our wonderful team of 16 Education Volunteers that we can accommodate such numbers and offer so many varied workshops to engage and inspire.

The workshops range from Wilfrid Bear workshops and tours to children understanding faith through Art and Architecture, Signs and Symbols. Our workshops include children dressing up as monks and learn about how St Wilfrid was inspired to build the stone church here in Ripon like the ones he saw in Rome. Children are very excited to visit our Anglo-Saxon Crypt, learn about the symbolism of the Mother and Child statues and creating their own in clay, looking at Baptism and Communion with Canon Matthew and how faith is lived out today. Children enjoy dressing as medieval pilgrims and creating their own reliquary boxes. We also mark Remembrance-tide with secondary schools pupils looking at the ethics of war and learning about the soldiers, sailors and nurses commemorated on our war memorial plaques as well as having a safari lecture about the war poet Wilfrid Owen. We then round of the term with lots of Fantastic Festivals workshops looking at Advent, Christmas and sharing Christingle services together.

# CELEBRATING ECO ACTIONS AT THE CATHEDRAL ECO CHURCH AWARDS EXHIBITION



The recent exhibition 'Eco Church Awards in the Diocese of Leeds' sent a hopeful message about churches responding to the challenges of the climate emergency and the biodiversity crisis. 12 churches and 3 cathedrals were exhibited at various stages in their Eco Church journey and every journey was different.

The Eco Church Award scheme is wonderful because it encourages churches to focus on many aspects of

'living gently on the earth' and to celebrate every action along the way, as progress is made to the next award.

Peter Edwards, the project manager at St Mary's, Embsay, where they are changing from gas to electric heating to become Net Zero Carbon by 2025 says 'Start with small steps and celebrate each one. This helps to break down resistance to change.'

### POWERPOINT PRESENTATION OF ECO ACTIONS 2023 -24

A 'Balance Sheet of Eco Actions' using the five Eco Church categories to celebrate hopeful Eco actions was created by Ros Swaney, PEO.

Charlie Brown transferred this into a PowerPoint presentation, which was shown in the Cathedral for three weeks, following the launch of the Annual Review. It is encouraging to read this summary.

# TOILET TWINNING IN THORPE PREBEND – Toilets, Sanitation and Training – A life-saving trio

You can now see a Toilet Twinning certificate in the four toilets in Thorpe Prebend. **Ripon Cathedral has twinned four toilets overseas.** It costs £60 to twin a toilet and you receive a certificate to display in your toilet which has a picture, and GPS coordinates, of its sister toilet overseas. The money is used to give hygiene education and to provide materials, so that families and communities can build their own latrines. This gives users dignity and self-respect as well as safe sanitation.

The World Health Organisation/UNICEF estimate that 1.7 billion people do not have somewhere safe to go to the toilet. A welcome outcome of toilet twinning has been a reduction in sexual assaults, as people are no longer required to seek out isolated spots or to go to the toilet under cover of darkness.



### Toilet Twin as a Christmas Gift

# RIPON TOGETHER 'GREEN FAIR' a GREAT SUCCESS!

Over 250 people visited the Green Fair in Allhallowgate Methodist Church on Saturday 5<sup>th</sup> October. There was a buzz in the main hall with 26 stalls and a steady stream of visitors. In the Chapel, which is a tiered auditorium, there were 20-minute talks by 11 speakers on a wide range of green transition topics. Feedback from visitors was excellent and Ripon Together plan to hold the



third Green Fair in autumn 2025. Eco Church was represented by Ros Swaney and Christian Aid by Dorothy Gray and Margaret Shepherd.

### 'WHAT ECO ACTIONS DO YOU TAKE IN YOUR LIFE?'

On the Eco Church stall, Ros had many interesting conversations by asking visitors 'What hopeful Eco actions do you do in your life?'

Children prompted their parents with – 'We walk to school' and 'We re-cycle' and 'You've got bees. Dad.'

There were many positive responses of people doing what they could to go greener and many said they use charity shops for clothes, books and gifts, grow their own veg and walk instead of using the car.

One tip from Cllr Barbara Brodigan, Ripon and North Yorkshire Councillor, was to cut food waste. She said because one third of food produced globally is wasted, she started using the food App 'Too Good to Go' <a href="https://www.toogoodtogo.com/en-gb">https://www.toogoodtogo.com/en-gb</a>

When I downloaded the App, on Saturday 19<sup>th</sup> October at 11.00am, I discovered that I could get a Surprise Bag of chilled food £5 from Booths, groceries £3.30 from Morrisons, hot food £2.50 from Morrisons café and fresh food £4 from Nisa Local. I was too late for a Surprise Bag from Appletons £3.50, a Sweet and Pastry Bag £2.59 from Café Nero, Meat and Fish from Booths £5, and Groceries from Aldi £3.30.

This app seems to be well known and has been going for 4 years. I've just joined. Have you tried it yet?






