A NOTE FROM THE DEAN

Ring in the Christ that is to be

A friend recently bought me the book, 365 Poems for Life, compiled by Allie Esiri. This was a kind and well-chosen gift for what I still describe as my 'insignificant' birthday. The wonderful thing is that it delivers what it promises on the cover, 'an uplifting collection of poems for every day of the year.'

Pleasingly, Alfred, Lord Tennyson's *Ring out, wild* bells (from *In Memoriam*) is chosen for 31st December and the turn of the year. Its final line provides us with the perfect prayer for any day, one that expresses a heart-felt desire for the Christ who will guide us into the future, 'Ring in the Christ that is to be.'

The turn of the year lies firmly within the season of Christmas, of course. So, we are receiving plenty of reassurance that this Christ is Emmanuel, the loving God of heaven who is with us every year. In fact, rather like several collections of poems compiled by Allie Esiri, he longs to be with us every day of the year. Sadly, too often, we might be tempted to tune into Christ when prompted by challenges and difficulties, rather like taking down a half-remembered book when looking for comfort and consolation, or returning to an old friend whom we had neglected in 'better times'. Christmas assures us that the eternal God of heaven, as seen in Christ, is down to earth and promises to be with us in every circumstance of life. But he does invite us forward, leading us into his future.

Advent reminded us that to accept the gift of Christ is to be prepared to leave behind those things that hold us back from him and the fullness of life he longs for us to enjoy. Alfred, Lord Tennyson got the sense of being prepared to let the past go,

Ring out, wild bells, to the wild sky, The flying cloud, the frosty light: The year is dying in the night; Ring out, wild bells, and let him die.

Ring out the old, ring in the new, Ring, happy bells, across the snow: The year is going, let him go; Ring out the false, ring in the true.

He has the wisdom to encourage us to leave behind old pains and griefs which can become such a part of a person's identity, even changing who they are in themselves,

Ring out the grief that saps the mind For those that here we see no more; Ring out the feud of rich and poor, Ring in redress to all mankind. A little later in the poem, the prayer is for life-changing repentance. As always with a sincere turning back towards following Christ, this can change an individual and the world for the better.

Ring out false pride in place and blood, The civic slander and the spite; Ring in the love of truth and right, Ring in the common love of good.

This looking forward continues - in positive, hopeful spirit, determined to be transformed for the better, until in the end we are brought face to face with Christ,

Ring out old shapes of foul disease; Ring out the narrowing lust of gold; Ring out the thousand wars of old, Ring in the thousand years of peace.

Ring in the valiant man and free, The larger heart, the kindlier hand; Ring out the darkness of the land, Ring in the Christ that is to be.

Well, we can certainly enter 2025 praying for an end to the sort of curses highlighted by Tennyson - slander, spite, diseases, addictions, and wars. These and others have spoiled the lives of individuals and communities, not least in the days of 2024. And, inspired by Tennyson, we can pray, hope and work for truth and right, for the love of good, for the quiet victory of peace, and for generosity to those in need ('the larger heart, the kindlier hand').

Growing God's Kingdom: ringing in the Christ that is to be

Tennyson leaves us looking forward to the possibility of a better world, of being better ourselves, by pointing us to Christ. His poem seems to inspire both devotion in prayer (and I would include worship, repentance, feasting on scripture and the sacraments), and in service to the world – all focused on Christ. This resonates powerfully with our cathedral vision, Growing God's Kingdom. The whole breadth of our vision is part of our focusing on Christ and following his lead into the future we believe he desires not just for the Church, but also for the world it exists to serve. At Ripon we have discerned that for us this includes growing as a worshipping community, forming excellent choristers and musicians, serving the diocese, engaging with rural communities, partnering with local charities, providing essential 21st century facilities, conserving and sharing our magnificent cathedral building, and caring for the environment by reducing our carbon footprint to at least net-zero.

All this is inspired by following the Christ whose birth we celebrate at Christmas and whose call we seek to heed as we step forward into 2025. The pages of the January – February Newsletter are filled with examples of how this is so, including both implicit and explicit encouragement to focus on Christ, and join in.

Epiphany, Baptism of Christ and Candlemas: ringing in the Christ that is to be

In coming days and weeks, there are at least three significant feasts which help us to ponder the full nature and character of the Christ who comes to save us and help us to become the individuals and communities he longs us to be.

The main celebration of **Epiphany** will be on Sunday, 5th January at 10.30am. The gifts of the magi will remind us, once again, of the nature of the one whose purpose is to reign in heaven and earth (combining in his care things worldly and spiritual) and being prepared to suffer for the sake of his divine love and mission.

The Baptism of Christ is celebrated on Sunday, 12th January at 10.30am, giving us an opportunity to ponder what love Christ showed in being prepared to be baptized by his cousin John. We are invited to renew our own baptismal vows, recommitting ourselves anew in our Christian discipleship early in the new year.

Ripon has become well known for the enthusiasm with which we celebrate **Candlemas**. The Festal Eucharist, with several thousand candles blazing, will be on Saturday 1st February at 5.30pm. Please note both the date and the time (we usually celebrate this on 2nd at 7.30pm; **this year it is on 1st February at 5.30pm!**).

Candlemas is the time when, ceasing to ponder Jesus' nativity, we gaze forward towards the approaching season of Lent and Holy Week. The aged Simeon's prediction that Jesus would be opposed, and Mary would herself suffer ('a sword will pierce your own soul too'), prompts the inevitable change of mood. For now, we are still celebrating Christmas and the turn of the year.

Lent 2025 at Ripon Cathedral

This year Lent begins with Ash Wednesday on 5th March with a said service of Holy Communion with the imposition of Ash at 10.00am and a Solemn Eucharist with the choir at 5.30pm. And the year will end with another choir tour, this time to London. The choir are already booked in to sing Evensong at Westminster Abbey at the end of July, as well as a sung Eucharist on the last Sunday of that month.

Confirmation 2025

In the New Year, we will begin to prepare those, who are interested in developing their faith for Confirmation.

In the Church of England, Confirmation is a special church service in which a person confirms the promises that were made when they were baptized. If you were baptized at a christening when you were a child, your parents and godparents made these promises on your behalf. As a young person or adult, you may be ready to affirm these promises for yourself and commit your life to following Jesus Christ. At a confirmation service, you make these promises for yourself. Your friends and family as well as the local Christian community will be there to promise to support and pray for you.

We are holding a special Confirmation service at Ripon Cathedral on **Sunday 1 June at 3.30pm** at which the Bishop of Leeds will lay his hands on your head and ask God's Holy Spirit to give you the strength and commitment to live God's way for the rest of your life.

EDUCATION AND ALL AGE LEARNING

The Education Team have broken all records this year. They have delivered events – learning packages, holiday club activities or schools services – to more than 2150 children. And that's contributed to record levels of income for the Cathedral from the department as well. As well as having excellent learning packages for primary school age children, we have been expanding into working more with secondary school students as well.

We have also been developing more learning packages for the younger children. In the run up to Christmas we have been offering Christmas workshops – telling the Christmas story and ensuring the children understand the significance of the story for Christians – topped off with a Christingle service using a giant sized visual aid.







Ripon Cathedral Renewed - a brief update



Where are we?

We are now progressing through the planning process with the amended plans for the much-needed cathedral annex. Following the additional period of consultation early in 2024, much of the rest of the year was spent responding to the concerns and suggestions of the many people who engaged. It was encouraging to find that 77% of the almost 1,000 people who accepted our invitation to give feedback indicated support for our proposals. Even so, chapter was keen to respond to the concerns for the veteran beech tree. So, plans were amended and support secured from the Fabric Advisory Committee, Historic England, and the Cathedrals Fabric Commission for England. This triggered the period of public notice and opportunity for comment which runs out on 27th December.

Ripon City Council

As a consultee within the planning process, Ripon City Council determined its position at a very large meeting, held at Holy Trinity Church, on Monday, 9th December. Many people spoke in support of the cathedral's plans. Others, of course, spoke passionately in opposition. One of the few councillors to speak argued in favour of the cathedral, making some important points, but to no avail. The council chose to support the latter by voting 7 to 1 in favour of a pre-prepared motion.

North Yorkshire Council Planning Officers and Planning Committee

The situation now, at the time of writing and as the cathedral focuses on preparing to celebrate Christmas, is that the green public planning notices are posted around Minster Gardens, inviting comments by 27th December. There is no guarantee that comments will be received after that date.

The planning officers will then consider the views of consultees (such as Historic England and Ripon City Council) and the letters submitted to them by the public. They will then determine their recommendation to the planning committee. The date when the cathedral's plans will go before the committee is not yet known.

How can I help?

Many people are asking what they can do to show support for Ripon Cathedral Renewed plans. The most effective way of showing support at this juncture is to write to the planning officers, either using their portal or by a letter in the post, expressing support for the amended plans (you may already have written in support of the first version – thank you) and stressing the need for the proposed facilities to be as near as possible to the cathedral.

GROWING GREENER – RIPON CATHEDRAL ENVIRONMENT NEWS

GOING GREEN IN 2025 – 6 YEARS TO THE NZC 2030 GOAL POSTS This is a very ambitious goal but it can be achieved in small steps.



ENVIRONMENT & NZC 2030 and the BUILDINGS COMMITTEE - STEPS TAKEN SOLAR PANELS

- An application has been made to North Yorkshire County Council, by the Cathedral architects, Oliver Caroe, for the installation of up to 90 solar panels on the south transept and library oof.
- Friends of Ripon Cathedral have kindly supported the cost of this application.
- Money will have to be raised for the installation of the solar panels.

ESTATE WIDE STRATEGY

- An estate-wide strategy report has been commissioned from Max Fordham Associates, funded by the Church Commissioners.
- This report will aid grant applications and inform the planning work of the Buildings Committee and the Environment and NZC 2030 Committee.

NEW GAS CONTRACT

- The new 3-year gas contract is made up of 90% offset gas and 10% biogas, which is a laudable improvement on brown gas. Thanks to the Senior Management Team for that decision.

EXTERNAL LIGHTING CONVERTED TO LED LIGHTS

- This project has been approved and will go ahead as soon as possible.

Thanks to the Friends of Ripon Cathedral for their generous support of this energy saving project.

MEASUREMENT and DATA COLLECTION

- The Environment and NZC 2030 Committee aim to measure temperature change and air movement in the Cathedral during the winter months.
- There is a vacancy on the Environment and NZC 2030 Committee since Rev Ruth Newton moved to Carlisle. Please speak to Canon Matthew Pollard or Ros Swaney if you have expertise to offer.

RIPON CATHEDRAL ECO ACTION GROUP – SMALL STEPS TOWARDS NZC 2030 SILVER SAVING CREATION COURSE – a new 8-week course runs from March 11 – May 20, with a break for Easter. The sessions are two hours on Tuesday evenings on Zoom led by Rev Jan Godair.

Loretta Williams thought the course was worthwhile although Zoom had its challenges!

B COP 29 EXHIBITION - IN SOLIDARITY FOR A GREEN WORLD

COP 29 was held in Baku, Azerbaijan from 11 to 22 November 2024. Over 83000 scientists attended the conference - politicians and world leaders, media journalists, lobbyists and non-governmental organisations in person and online.

The aim of the conference was to encourage "cities and communities to adopt lowemission climate resistant strategies supporting the objective of making cities and human settlements inclusive, safe, resilient and sustainable.



A modest exhibition, in the Cathedral around the time of COP, encouraged prayer for attendees at COP 29 to be inspired to put climate justice first.

Finance, both private and public capital, is seen as key to the world standing in solidarity with those most affected by climate change. Agreement was reached in Baku that donations of at least \$300 billion would be given by the developed world by 2035.

Much work is remains to be done to realise God's kingdom. Your prayers and actions however small are still needed to save our neighbours, habitat and all of God's creatures, overseas and locally from the ravages of climate change.

Explore the local bus routes and especially use the No 36 bus for trips to Harrogate and Leeds – this will encourage better public transport



B CARBON LITERACY – challenge yourself to understand more about global warming and climate change in 2025



THE CARBON LITERACY PROJECT

The Carbon Literacy Project is a trust which runs courses for individuals and organisations to increase understanding of the challenge of climate change and how we can act to make a difference.

We all want to look after nature and be good stewards to God's creation.



But living in the 21st century, in a world economy driven by fossil fuels, it is difficult to imagine how we can make the necessary changes to limit global warming to 1.5°.

ST. MARY'S CHURCH EMBSAY EXPECTS TO BE CARBON NEUTRAL IN 2025 – small steps to success

- 1. St Mary's started their carbon neutral journey in 2020 when they needed to plan to replace an aged gas boiler.
- 2. In consultation with the community and the congregation, they decided they wanted to use alternatives to fossil fuel energy and applied to the Rural Communities Energy Fund. Simultaneously they engaged with the Eco Church Award scheme and understanding grew about 'treading lightly on the planet' and 'living simply so that others could simply live'.
- 3. Peter Edwards and Diana Linford have led the project. They believe 'You have to take people with you. It is all about small steps and making people feel included.'
- 4. Now in 2025, St Mary's has a warm church, heated by a combination of electric under pew heaters and wall mounted radiant heaters. They have an electricity supply through 'Green Journey' and have reached their carbon neutral target. What an inspiring example of practical action.

The day of the stall others, including Margaret Shepherd and Anna Gisbourne, did a shift on the stall. The Cathedral congregation also visited the stall to cheer the sellers on and buy goods.

The success of the stall led to further stalls – at Ripon Together Green Fair, at the Cathedral Christmas Fair and at a Rotary Coffee morning at St Johns Bondgate. In between the stalls there was activity. Some branded handbags were put up for sale on the website Vinted (it is a sort of online jumble sale where you ask for a price and buyers offer bids) Sale prices for handbags on the site achieved the same prices as on the stalls. Janet took some "quality" jewellery to Rows of Ripon who bought some and checked others, free of charge. This meant we did charge a sensible price for jewellery and not give away real "gems".



Donations came from Ripon Cathedral congregation's relatives in the far flung south of Cambridge and westerly Cheshire.

Anne-Marie on behalf of C3 commissioned some wooden frames from **Ripon Mens Shed** to display necklaces to their best advantage.

Janet put together a seasonal Christmas Tree 'tombola' of small jewellery items. This was a huge success at the **Cathedral Christmas Fair** especially with children. Our donations included brand new handbags with their tags on and scarves still in their packaging. There was real quality in the generous donations. Buyers have "bagged a bargain" and goods have been given a second life. Our retail skills and knowledge have so improved there is enough for a Vocational Qualification in retailing!

Altogether this year the team at the Cathedral has raised around £ 4400.00 for Christian Aid. This will largely go to people we will never meet or know. In Caza or Syria or Burundi. We

meet or know. In Gaza or Syria or Burundi. We hope you can see that this inspiring sum has been achieved by virtual teamwork of many kind-hearted people in our congregation; in Ripon and beyond. All of the contributions from so many people – whether donating goods or buying goods, or serving on our stalls, or asking for unused items from people in exercise classes or of relatives – is a good



news story. Our heartfelt thanks and appreciation to you all. This has taken many hands both seen and unseen.

We are grateful to you and so too are those who will benefit from generosity. It is hard to really know why we give our time and energy – it could be loving Christian duty compassion or empathy. The older son in the parable of the Prodigal Son did not have his motivation revealed until his younger brother returned. We have future plans – the Cathedral Spring Fair; St Wilfrid's August 2025 and another box to Vintage Cash Cow. If you think of another opportunity to sell, then please let Dorothy Gray know!
