Welcome to this service

We welcome you to Ripon Cathedral on this Sunday as we approach Advent. We continue to celebrate the life of God, a community of love which enfolds the whole of creation and humanity. And we praise God for our home within the community of faith which is Christ's Church.

The annual cycle of the Church's year ends today with the Feast of Christ the King. The year that begins with the hope of the coming Messiah ends with the proclamation of his universal sovereignty. The ascension of Christ has revealed him to be Lord of earth and heaven, and final judgement is one of his proper kingly purposes. The Feast of Christ the King returns us to the Advent theme of judgement, with which the cycle once more begins.

As we worship God together in this ancient and sacred place of prayer, we pray that this cathedral community will be filled with God's life and love, and that we may reach out to include others in sharing our joy.
