MESSAGE FROM THE DEAN



The Church's Continued Service

Pope Francis

The recent death of Pope Francis led to an outpouring of genuine sorrow and gratitude from Christians, including countless beyond the Roman Catholic Church, and from many non-Christians. People were impressed by the depth and integrity of his faith in Christ, and by his desire to show Christ's love in acts of kindness and care to those most lowly and marginalized within society. TV images were broadcast of him washing the feet of prisoners, calling to mind the way in which Christ washed the disciples' feet to provide an example of servant leadership. The decision of Francis to be interred at Santa Maria Maggiore, a papal basilica outside the Vatican, suggests that he wanted to be seen to be reaching out even in death.

Archbishop of Canterbury

While the world has lost a great servant leader with the death of Pope Francis, we have been praying particularly for our Roman Catholic brothers and sisters, and especially for those cardinals on whom the responsibility for discerning God's choice of the next pope now rests. This in turn has also brought into focus the fact that we in the Church of England and the worldwide Anglican Communion are also praying for the members of the Crown Nomination Commission who will discern the person being chosen by God to be the next Archbishop of Canterbury. And in the period of vacancy at Lambeth Palace, we continue to pray for strength and patience for Archbishop Stephen as he leads the Church.

Yearning for the message of the Church

At turning points in the life of the Church, people naturally reflect on the relevance and value of the Church to society. The Church is growing globally, including in many places in England, and yet in Western society, with a culture which is perceived to be strongly secular, the mission and message of the Church can be seen to be anachronistic. This leaves even many of the faithful concluding that we are simply

'hanging on', with little confidence in the possibility of revival. And yet the commentary of much of the media around the time of the pope's death reflects an underlying yearning for the depth of spirituality, and related hope and meaning for life, which the Church has to share. Perhaps it is time for the Church to acknowledge this more obviously, showing a greater confidence that it remains Christ's precious gift to the world; a gift which is intended to help the Lord's Prayer be fulfilled - 'Thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven.'

Christian influence persists after 2,000 years

And perhaps there are more grounds for confidence than even we in the Church often appreciate. In his great tome, *Dominion*, Tom Holland traces the history of western, and more latterly global, thought over the past two thousand years. He illustrates how many underlying values and ethical principles are Christian. So, whether people regard themselves to be Christian or not, what they regard as being fundamentally good and right is influenced by Christ's teaching, as seen in scripture, and the teaching of the Church through the ages. And it would seem that many leaders in the realms of politics, banking, commerce, industry and so forth are only too willing to be prompted and inspired by the Church to reflect on the purpose of their endeavours and the values they need to embrace to be a blessing to society – adding value to social capital.

Mark Carney

In his book 'Value(s)', Mark Carney, now Prime Minister of Canada, speaks of the time when, as Governor of the Bank of England, he took part in a seminar in the Vatican. Following the catastrophic failure in the global banking system in 2007/08, participants were asked to consider how the market system could be changed to be something more positive and constructive. Policy makers, business people, academics, labour leaders and charity workers were amongst those taking part.

They were surprised when the pope joined them for lunch; he told them a parable. They would be having wine with lunch. Mark Carney recalls the pope telling them, 'This is many things. It has a bouquet, colour and richness of taste that all complement the food. It has alcohol that can enliven the mind. Wine enriches all our senses.'

The market and Christian principles

And the pope continued, 'At the end of our feast, we will have grappa. Grappa is one thing: alcohol. Grappa is wine distilled.'

And he went on, 'Humanity is many things – passionate, curious, rational, altruistic, creative, self-interested. But the market is one thing: self-interested. The market is humanity distilled.'

Then the pope challenged his guests, 'Your job is to turn the grappa back into wine, to turn the market back into humanity.'

This story, shared by Mark Carney, provides encouragement. There is hope if those engaged with systems of banking, commerce and investment are keen to ensure Christian principles are acknowledged and applied so that 'the market system' serves the common good and helps to build up what might be described as 'social capital'.

Church for the world

Despite this being aided by Christian values which are still commonly held, even if not understood to be Christian, it is undoubtedly the case that the value of Christian values is more likely to be appreciated and taken to heart when the Church introduces successive generations to its message and teaching. This involves sharing in every age the biblical accounts of Jesus Christ and the good news of the gospel. The thrust of the whole of scripture is seen to speak of a loving, creating, redeeming God who wants the best for all his children.

Seen in this way, the Church does not share the gospel to save and serve itself, to build up its strength for its own benefit. It is not to be like some market system which has become so self-interested that it has lost its humanity and its central mission to serve the whole of society. The sharing of the gospel, including the teaching and life of the Church, is Christ's precious gift for the sake of the whole world, given so that all God's children can enjoy fulness of life.


Quiet Revival

More evidence for confidence in the Church's mission in the 21st century comes from the recent report, *Quiet Revival*. Commissioned by the Bible Society, it shares evidence of how young people, aged 18 to 24, are turning to the Church for meaning and community. One gets the sense that while wanting the Church's teaching to be understandable and relevant to them, they do not want it to be trivialized and trite. Rather, they are looking for a depth of spirituality (that may not be how they would describe it) which helps them to navigate their path as flourishing human beings in a complex world. The world as it is experienced presents confusion and life-diminishing challenge as well as opportunities and blessings. Churches in all contexts need to be equipped to engage with people and respond to their searching questions. This is something we are keen to do at the cathedral, and it was encouraging to see a good number taking advantage of the breadth of groups and nurture material during Lent, and to note that a large number of people of all ages are being prepared for confirmation. We pray for them and encourage them as they look forward to being confirmed by Bishop Nick in June.

INTRODUCING OUR NEW CANON PASTOR



Wendy joins us from Canterbury Cathedral where since the autumn of 2023 she has been Precentor, Residentiary Canon Designate and Head of Worship and Events. This followed on from eight and a half years as Rector of the Parish Church of Loughborough in the Diocese of Leicester. During this time, she fostered an inclusive approach to pastoral care and worship, renewed civic and community partnerships and developed a vision for mission through music. She was incumbent of a rural multi- parish benefice in the Diocese of Guilford and has experience of both school and university chaplaincy. She has served as Area Dean, Chair of House of Clergy and on General Synod.

Prior to ordination she was a Youth and Community Worker, working with young people in faith based and community contexts as well as working with Juvenile and Young Offenders inside prisons on behalf of the YMCA. She continues to be passionate about fostering the spiritual development of children and young people. Twenty years ago, she left her sending church of St Helen's in Wakefield to be part of the first cohort of women to be formed for ordination at the College of the Resurrection in Mirfield where she then stayed to serve her curacy.

She has been attending the Christian inspired festival Greenbelt for more years than she cares to remember and remains inspired by the connection between faith, arts and justice. She is married to Chris, a retired police officer, who after a lifetime spent enjoying country sports in his spare time now gets to enjoy shooting and fishing on a much more regular basis. They have three grown up children and two grandchildren who are looking forward to spending time in Ripon.

Wendy writes:

'After many years away from God's own country we are so pleased to feel like we are coming home. I left what was then Wakefield Diocese 15 years ago and have had a rich experience of ministry which has continued to shape me after some very formative years at St Helen's in Wakefield and then as an ordinand and curate in Mirfield. NEWS FROM WORSHIP & MUSIC

There have been so many positive comments about the music of Holy Week and Easter. I do nope that you were able to experience some of it first hand. From extracts of *Massaino's* Lamentations from the 16th century and Plainsong at the start of Holy Week in the services of Compline to more modern Britten and Dove at Easter, there was something for everyone.

The Dean paid heartfelt thanks to Dr Krippner and the whole music team on Easter Day after the main service and I am sure that the round of applause was just a mere hint of the appreciation that we all felt.

This year we were also privileged to hold the Annual Chrism service for the Diocese. Many clergy, who appreciate music, commented afterwards about what an inspiring service it was. Why become a Chorister?



Every child receives an outstanding and bespoke training by our team of professional musicians, from voice coaches to choir directors. Being a chorister offers children a life-changing opportunity and helps improve resilience, self-discipline and self-confidence.

What are we looking for?

No previous singing experience is required. Prospective choristers need to have a good ear, a spark in their eyes, like singing, and above all want to be a team player. The rest of it is hard work and good fun! Parents need to be willing to commit to the full choral schedule.

PILGRIM CELLO 2025

Meditation on the Seven Last Words of Christ

All 42 English cathedrals. 2,000 miles. With a cello. On a bike.

Cumbrian cellist and poet Kenneth Wilson, 66, is known for his mad projects. But perhaps this one – *Pilgrim Cello* – is the maddest of all.

Starting on 18 May, Kenneth will cycle, with his cello, 2,000 miles around all 42 of the English Anglican cathedrals.

It's not just a bike ride, however. It's a pilgrimage, in the ancient tradition of Christian journeying. And it's also a concert tour. Kenneth will be giving a performance of a specially-written *Meditation* in 40 of the 42 cathedrals.

He has already performed the *Meditation on the Seven Last Words* in cathedrals as far apart as Salisbury, Rochester, and Liverpool. The *Meditation* is a moving evocation of Jesus's last hours on the cross, combining Kenneth's short poems with the timeless solo cello music of Bach.

"It's more than a religious work, though," Kenneth explains. "The *Meditation* offers music and poetry that has meaning well beyond that. Even if you've never been in a cathedral before, I hope the *Meditation* – as well as the journey – will speak to you!"

Three years ago Kenneth cycled, with his cello, from Hadrian's Wall to Rome. On that journey he performed in tents, in halls, in the open on the highest paved road over the Alps, and at the Musei Capitolini in Rome. His book, *Highway Cello*, about that journey, was described by best-selling author Christi Daugherty as "an absolute charmer of a travel book." The Dalai Lama called his earlier work, *Orange Dust: Journeys After the Buddha*, "inspirational" and "uplifting."

As well as music and poetry, there is another dimension to *Pilgrim Cello*. As Kenneth explains, "I will also be carrying with me seven iconic paintings by abstract artist Gillian Lever, which vividly illustrate the *Seven Last Words*. They underline the "pilgrimage" element of the 2,000-mile journey, and will be displayed at each cathedral performance."

As well as coming to see a performance, Kenneth hopes that some cyclists might be inspired to join him for a bit of a ride as he passes through the area. But if you do, he promises not to ask you to carry the cello!

The *Meditation* consists of JS Bach's beautiful solo cello music, interspersed with poems of reflection on Jesus's last words from the cross. Kenneth will be performing it in Ripon cathedral on **Wednesday 21 May 2025 at 2pm.**

The performance lasts about 50 minutes. Entry is free, with a retiring collection.

NEWS FROM THE EDUCATION OFFICER

Anglo-Saxon STEM (Science, technology, engineering and maths) Workshops

Tues 11th March with Year 6 pupils from Terrington Hall. Pupils explored the Anglo-Saxon Crypt and investigated how huge weights were transferred and how masons constructed the arches. They constructed their own mini cranes as part of this workshop and even solved Anglo-Saxon riddles with Sue and Betty.

Easter Workshop

Also on Tues 25th March Year 3 pupils came to explore the story of Easter. Canon Matthew was an excellent Centurion recounting what he saw at the foot of the cross. Pupils were relieved it was Canon Matthew really because he had his glasses on! Wendy B shocked pupils in



her role as Jesus turning over the tables of the money changers in the Temple but then they thought she made a very nice Jesus afterwards. Daire used signing to explore betrayal and pupils had to spot the signs of betrayal in the drama of the Last Supper and in the Garden of Gethsemane, Children learnt to sign Resurrection to celebrate life after death and Jesus' presence with us. Children also crafted their own Easter crosses with our Education volunteers and went exploring for signs and symbols around the Cathedral which they loved.

Anglo-Saxon Workshop

On Weds 26th March 60 pupils from Holy Trinity School came their teacher Louise Stow shared:

'We had a wonderful time and the children came back with a real sense of the historical significance of St Wilfrid during the Anglo-Saxon period.'

Exploring the Interaction of Science and Faith at our God and the Big Bang Workshop for Secondary Pupils Tuesday 18th March attended by 59 Secondary school pupils.

Prof Paul McFadden, Department of Mathematical Sciences at Durham University Theoretical Physics and Theoretical Cosmology

Prof Paul spoke to pupils from Nidderdale High School and Queen Mary's School about his work studying quantum theory and how in his work he sees beauty and order that leads him to his own position of faith.

Abi Falkus

Abi graduated from Exeter University with an undergraduate degree in Biological Sciences in 2022, specialising in Molecular and Cellular Biology. She then studied climate science at King's College London, specialising in Geographical Information Science in flood risk map making. She now works full-time for God and the Big Bang and lives in North London.

Abi leads the God and the Big Bang Team touring Cathedrals sharing the compatibility of science and faith through Interactive workshops. The workshops are informative and engaging and equip students with the tools to form their own opinions.

Francesca Blondell Francesca has just completed an undergraduate master's in physics at Durham university with a focus on laser physics, researching the development of organic lasing. She is going on to undertake a PhD, also based in Durham, in quantum simulation with ultracold molecules. Alongside studies, she has been actively involved in youth and student ministries.

Combining a love for science and her faith has been a hope of Francesca's since she started taking both seriously at sixth form. This came to realisation through a Radio Maria podcast following the faith journeys of academics and students in the sciences through which she was introduced to God and the Big Bang where she has been leading workshops since March 2023.

Francesca shared how her research into molecules in the lab also has deepened her faith in God.

GIVING THANKS FOR THE LIFE OF POPE FRANCIS

On the 21st of April, millions of people around the world mourned the death of Pope Francis whose clear Christian message had touched many hearts.

In 2013, when he chose Francis for his papal name, Pope Francis indicated he shared Francis of Assisi's passion to care for all creation.

Two years later, in May 2015 he released his major encyclical on the environment, 'Laudato Si' (*Praise be to you*), in time to influence the UN Climate Agreement talks in Paris.

In October 2023, in advance of the UN Climate Change Conference (COP28), Pope Francis issued the apostolic exhortation 'Laudate Deum' (*Praise God*) in which he called for decisive action against the climate crisis and condemned climate change denial.

His support for environmental and human justice has inspired and will continue to inspire millions of people around the world. His legacy is to give hope that human actions can preserve and nurture our world for the benefit of all and conserve it for future generations.

FEEDBACK from the LENT ECO TALKS

Thursday 13/3/25 – Seeking Sanctuary in Ripon; supporting refugee families This event was led by Yvonne Jeffries and Emma Wright with the participation of a local Afghan family. It was a most enjoyable and interactive evening with a real understanding gained of the challenges faced by refugee families and the adaptations they make to be accepted. Over 40 people attended.

Wednesday 2/4/25 Practical Steps for Churches towards Net Zero Carbon 2030 This was organised by Ros Swaney and introduced by Canon Matthew The speakers were Rose Gosling of Summerbridge Methodist Church and Peter Edwards of St Mary's Embsay who gave practical and encouraging talks about actions which can be taken. Over 20 people attended from 9 different churches and excellent feedback was received.

LENT EXHIBITION – 'FINDING GOD IN NATURE'

A simple prayer station was up in the Cathedral for the six weeks of Lent. Each week a symbolic item was added to ask for thankfulness for our sustaining world. The prayers were about Trees, Flowers, Soil, Water, Insects and Animals, and Birds and Air. Leaflets from A Rocha and Eco Church were provided and needed to be replenished regularly. An envelope with two sunflowers seeds was available for visitors to take away during the last two weeks. This was a final symbol of our role as to be good stewards of the God's world.

EARTH DAY - APRIL 22

The first-ever Earth Day was held in 1970 in the United States, when 20 million people took to the streets to protest against big environmental issues, including oil spills, polluted rivers and air pollution. This sounds familiar - 55 years later!

The movement has now spread globally, celebrated by millions of



people across the world. It's a chance for people to honour the achievements of the environmental movement and highlight the need to protect the planet. This year the theme is 'Our Power, Our Planet' and calls for renewable electricity generation to be tripled by 2030 around the world.

FOREVER HOME AND SUSTAINABILITY – cutting out fossil fuels

Dorothy Gray, joint Cathedral Environment Officer, has been speaking to people in

the congregation about their eco actions and she is delighted to find that quite a few are installing air-source heat pumps.

Sue (youthful and patient) and Tony Gill (kind and meticulous), on moving to their home in Fisher Green decided that they wished it to be sustainable and future-proofed. They researched and learned that good insulation and an up-to-date Energy Performance Certificate (EPC) were needed to apply for a government grant for air source heating.

An independent energy consultant did a preliminary survey which has been invaluable. Tony also followed through on



obtaining several quotes for the work recommended. These varied in price and on what was necessary regarding pipework or larger radiators, so he also did some haggling. The outcome is that they have fourteen solar panels on their south-facing rear roofs. They also have batteries in the hall cupboard for storing surplus power. Heating is provided by an air source pump, which is not noisy. Also, importantly, they are not cold but toasty.



You probably know that the Gills are great hosts, so they have children and grandchildren most weekends and holiday times – all needing baths and showers. The hot water supply has not failed. They are pleased with their investment.

The original forecast was for their capital outlay to be recouped in ten to twelve years, but as energy has risen in cost, it is now likely to be achieved in seven years.

They have apps on their phones which allow them to monitor their energy production and usage. To date, they have saved 7.92 tonnes of CO2 – this is the equivalent of planting 120 trees in 903 days.

CHECKING THE CONSERVATION AREA in APRIL

A surprisingly large spread of scilla was observed in the corner by High St Agnesgate and the church hall carpark wall at the start of the month. It lasted three weeks. Violets were in abundance near the blackberries in the north but not in




flower and soon to be overtaken by cleavers and cow parsley. Celandine were tumbling down the bank. Primroses were popping up everywhere. The first bluebells and cow parsley flowers bloomed towards the end of the month.

We must thank our groundsman, Tim, who mowed an attractive path through the Conservation Area. This will enable walkers to see the wildflowers up close and also allow selective weeding to take place as the Eco Action Group learns more about the wildflower growing patterns in the area.

The 'CHURCHES COUNT ON NATURE' event on June 7th will be very beneficial as it will help to get a baseline record of the species in the Conservation Area and the rest of the Cathedral churchyard.
