A very warm welcome to Ripon Cathedral as we gather to say thank you and farewell to Bishop Nick and Linda.

This service is prompted by Bishop Nick's retirement at the end of this month. We in the Diocese of Leeds are bound to reflect with a deep sense of gratitude upon the past 11 years during which Bishop Nick has provided exceptional pastoral care and leadership as the first Anglican Bishop of Leeds. The vibrancy and sense of common mission within the diocese is testament to the remarkable ways in which God has blessed us through Bishop Nick's skills and commitment to the whole diocese and region.

As Bishop Nick retires, it is also appropriate to thank God for the whole of his ordained ministry over 38 years. He has served as curate in Kendal and then Leicester; as Vicar of Rothley and Archdeacon of Lambeth; he was consecrated bishop in 2003 and served as Bishop of Croydon and as Bishop of Bradford. Then through his ministry as Bishop of Leeds, he has also developed trusting, fruitful relationships with our overseas links and with people in public life in this country, not least through the House of Lords.

In addition to the invaluable service she has given to the region as a health visitor, and her support of community groups using her talents as a glass artist, Linda has shown a gift for generous hospitality at home and providing an encouraging smile and supportive comments at diocesan events.

Of this gospel I have become a servant according to the gift of God's grace that was given me by the working of his power. Although I am the very least of all the saints, this grace was given to me to bring to the Gentiles the news of the boundless riches of Christ, and to make everyone see what is the plan of the mystery hidden for ages in God who created all things; so that through the church the wisdom of God in its rich variety might now be made known to the rulers and authorities in the heavenly places. This was in accordance with the eternal purpose that he has carried out in Christ Jesus our Lord, in whom we have access to God in boldness and confidence through faith in him.
