

A NOTE FROM THE DEAN



What would the world be like if Christ were running the show? A rollercoaster of celebration, lament and hope

November and December see the calendar of Ripon Cathedral filled with significant acts of worship, concerts and a Christmas Fair. It is a rollercoaster of celebration lament and hope, one on which we are invited to contemplate what our lives and the world might be like if Christ were allowed to reign on earth as he does in heaven. What would the world be like if Christ were running the show? What would our lives be like if we really allowed him in to be our Lord and King?

On this rollercoaster of November and December, we rapidly move through what we call The Kingdom Season, Advent and the first seven days of Christmas. This all begins with our celebration of All Saints – being inspired by those who in ordinary lives have enabled heaven to break through into the world. All Souls on 2nd November reminds us of those we love and from whom we are parted, painfully, by death. Comfort comes from the belief that both sides of the grave we are held in God's love.

An inevitable sombre tone of lament is sustained when it comes to Remembrance. The tragic conflicts of the past, with their colossal loss of life and human wellbeing, give us an opportunity to learn from the cost of standing up to great powers of evil, and the cost of not doing so. The same could be said on 16th November when we will keep Safeguarding Sunday, remembering how Christ's hope for all his children is that they may experience 'life in its fullness', and as we participate in 16 days of activism against gender-based violence.

The Feast of Christ the King, the Sunday before Advent Sunday (23rd November), sets all our celebration and lament in a hopeful perspective. As Christians, with the confidence that comes from the resurrection of Jesus

Christ from the dead, we believe that Christ will one day reign on earth as he does in heaven. The rays of heavenly light, reflected in the lives of saints, loved ones and those who have stood up to life-destroying evil seen in warfare and abuse, are acknowledged to be signs of what will be seen in full when Christ returns to put all things right. It is this hope for the total dispelling of the world's darkness that gives shape to our keeping of Advent, patiently waiting for the coming Christ. Little wonder that our carol services on Advent Sunday (30th November) and at Christmas are so popular, giving delight and encouragement. They emphasise this same hope of Christ reigning on earth as he does in heaven, strengthened with the evidence Christmas provides of God's enduring faithfulness towards us.

Glorious Kingdom

Perhaps the simple answer to the question of what the world and our lives would be like if Christ were running the show is - a glorious kingdom. *Glorious Kingdom* is the title of the new Ripon Cathedral Choir CD. The launch of this perfect Christmas gift is another thing happening at the cathedral over the coming weeks. Directed by Ronny Krippner and accompanied on the organ by Tim Harper, the choir provides life-enhancing inspiration and joy. The sixteen tracks helpfully include Basil Harwood's *O how glorious is the kingdom*.

Yet again, we are prompted to ask our question - what would the world be like if Christ were running the show? How glorious could it be? The answer, of course, relates to how Jesus revealed God's nature. The hope comes from the firm belief that one day his reign will become a full reality in a Christ-like world.

The walls of human division

Presumably, Christ's kingdom on earth will be free of those walls of division that we humans seem only too adept at building.

In 2022, an anthology of poems by the online poet Brian Bilston was published. Entitled, *Days Like These*, it contains a poem for every day of the year, each one relating to something of significance or interest on its day. The poem for 9th November is called *The Wall*. It reflects on the fall of the Berlin Wall on that day in 1989, a wall which had been built of concrete in 1961 to prevent East Germans accessing West Germany and which was fifteen feet high and topped with barbed wire. Watch towers and gun emplacements were also a memorable feature. In his introduction to the poem, Bilston

explains that the wall was an ideological barrier which had come to symbolise the Cold War. Its fall signalled the collapse of communism in Eastern and Central Europe.

The poem ends by raising the question of what the wall had stood for, why it had ever been built in the first place.

In the rubble and the mess, Fast and West met.

winter-coated in brick dust, wary, at first, of cuts

from shreds of barbed wire. Reaching across, they smiled,

at such freedom of movement, united in one moment.

And afterwards, they talked, both thinking of the wall,

wondering what it had stood for, why it had been built at all.

The reconciling work of Christ – a long way from the walls of human division and the way to a better world

The optimism that existed in the world following the fall of the wall perhaps seems distant in the light of the destruction seen in Gaza and Ukraine. Perhaps we might also be tempted to lose heart when contemplating how human hatred and loss of integrity spills over through the channels of social media to encourage hatred and division in those communities of which we are a part – not that there is anything wrong with the medium, simply with how it is employed.

All that goes on in the cathedral over coming months is intended to celebrate and remind us of the sure grounds we have for hope in an imperfect world. In hope and with hope, we are encouraged to ponder what our lives and the world might look like when Christ is allowed to reign on earth as he does in heaven. We hope for a time when, as with those who stood on the rubble of the Berlin Wall, the lack of merit of past hatred and conflict is brought into sharp focus.

Perhaps over coming months, we can begin to see afresh how, when Christ is running the show, the world will be reconciled to him and to itself. As St. Paul wrote in 2 Corinthians 5:19, '...in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us.' And perhaps we might commit ourselves anew to living in a way which makes the fruits of Christ's reconciling work more of a present reality as well as a future hope.

Farewell to Bishop Nick and his wife, Linda

We will be saying farewell to Bishop Nick and his wife, Linda, in a diocesan service in Ripon Cathedral on Sunday 23rd November at 3.30pm - Bishop Nick retires on 30th November. All are welcome, though with large numbers expected, we do ask people to book a ticket (free, of course!) online or by contacting the Cathedral Office.

Bishop Nick became Bishop of Leeds in June 2014 and was installed in his three cathedrals over the following weeks. The role was an enormous responsibility for anyone to accept, and it is probably the case that few people in the Church of England at that time would have been capable of rising to the challenge. A new diocese was being created – it had become a legal reality on Easter Day that year - but remarkably little preparation had taken place. I remember being surprised, as a newly arrived dean, to be asked by the bishop to join a small group to draft a governance structure for the diocese. He then invited me to chair the group which was overseeing the delivery of the new diocesan office. I have forgiven him! Needless to say, he was asking others to take on other pieces of work, all necessary building blocks for a diocese to get 'up and running'.

What has been achieved in the development of the Diocese of Leeds over the last 11 years is remarkable. The Archbishops' Appointment Secretary and Prime Minster's Appointment Secretary have recently been conducting an extensive consultation as part of the process by which Bishop Nick's successor will be discerned. They have commented on how cohesive and unified the diocese seems to be. This is all the more impressive when one considers how this still young diocese, transcending several county boundaries and including

almost the whole of West Yorkshire and half of North Yorkshire, serves widely differing communities over such a vast area.

This visible achievement is a testament to Bishop Nick's gift for leadership, good judgement, attention to detail and relentless hard work. It leaves hidden the inevitable countless quiet pastoral encounters, words of encouragement, and challenging conversations. Neither does it reveal the need for courage and determination which has been required of the Bishop of Leeds in this remarkable Church of England project of historic significance.

In every ordination service, the truth is shared that no one can bear the burden of ministry in their own strength alone. Serving Christ in his Church and world is only possible by the grace and strength of the Holy Spirit. We thank God, then, as we thank Bishop Nick for all he has done and achieved. Of course, the bishop has benefited not just from the support of a good God, but also that of a most wonderful wife. In addition to the invaluable service she has given to the region as a health visitor, and her support of community groups using her talents as a glass artist, Linda has shown a gift for generous hospitality at home and providing an encouraging smile and supportive comments at diocesan events.

We will miss both Bishop Nick and Linda. In the farewell service, we will express our gratitude to them and to God, reflecting on how fortune the Diocese of Leeds has been. We will pray that they enjoy a long and very happy retirement back in their native Liverpool.

NEWS FROM THE WORSHIP & MUSIC DEPARTMENT

As I write in the days after the Patronal weekend, which saw the full Choral Foundation sing both an Evensong and a Eucharist with numbers swelled by the Alumni of Ripon Cathedral choir, I found myself reflect on the success of the choir over recent years. SAFEGUARDING NEWS AND UPDATES

from our Cathedral Safeguarding Officer and Cathedral Safeguarding Lead

As we approach **Safeguarding Sunday on 16th November** we thought we would update you on how safeguarding is working here Ripon Cathedral. One of the key cultural shifts in safeguarding over the last few years in both church life and across wider society is to say that **Safeguarding is Everybody's Responsibility**. This approach we see being embedded here at the Cathedral in a number of ways: our dedicated staff and volunteers taking part in safeguarding training, the ways in which collectively we respond to pastoral and welfare needs as we encounter them, and the commitment made by Chapter to keep investing in the resources to build a Cathedral community where all can flourish.



We have recently updated the ways in which anyone, staff, volunteers, worshippers and visitors can report a non-emergency concern to us via the use of an electronic form. Please visit the link via the QR code or by visiting the Safeguarding section on our website. You can also continue to contact the Cathedral Safeguarding Team via calling us on: 01765 643889 or emailing safeguarding@riponcathedral.org.uk but we hope the form will prove easy to use.

Our Cathedral Safeguarding Team is made up of:

Cathedral Safeguarding Lead - Canon Pastor (CSL)

Canon Wendy holds strategic leadership for Safeguarding and along with our CSO (see below) is the first point of contact for welfare and safeguarding concerns and for victims and survivors of church abuse.

Cathedral Safeguarding Officer - Safeguarding Professional (CSO)

Sarah Lynch provides professional safeguarding advice on concerns that are raised, with the authority to act independently of the Dean and other Cathedral staff if required. Alongside the CSL (see above) acts as the first point of contact for welfare and safeguarding concerns and for victims and survivors of church abuse.

Safeguarding Coordinator – Chief Operating Officer (CSC)

Carol Pyrah supports the CSL in implementing operational leadership for safeguarding and integrating safeguarding into the functional running of the Cathedral as an employer, visitor attraction and historic place of worship.

In all of this we continue to be supported by the Diocesan Safeguarding Team with whom we enjoy a good working relationship bringing their wisdom, training and support to our inhouse team and by our internal Recruitment Administrator, Charlie Stewart who administers the safer recruitment process, including DBS checks, of all staff and volunteers.

We hope you will be able to join us on **Sunday 16th November** when we commit ourselves once again to the ongoing task of creating a church where all 'may dwell in safety.'

16 Days of Activism Against Gender Violence, 25 November to 10 December 2025

The United Nations 16 Days of Activism Against Gender Violence are held annually between 25 November and 10 December. This year Ripon Cathedral will mark the 16 Days with a special exhibition of artwork originally commissioned for White Ribbon UK, working with male prisoners at HMP Hull. White Ribbon UK is the leading charity in England and Wales that works to end men's violence against women and girls. It aims to prevent violence from happening in the first place by

engaging men and boys to be part of the solution. White Ribbon challenges harmful ideas about gender that lead to inequality and abuse.

The Mothers' Union Rise Up campaign against domestic abuse also aims to raise awareness of domestic abuse, which can happen to anyone, anywhere. The shocking fact is that one in three women world wide will encounter domestic abuse at some point in their lives. The letters of RISE UP stand for Respond, Inform, Support, Empower, Unite and Pray. Mothers' Union members here in the Ripon Episcopal Area of the Diocese of Leeds campaign year round to raise awareness of domestic abuse. We collaborate with local aid agencies such as Women's Aid, New Beginnings and local refuges to support to victims and their families.

The exhibition of paintings will be launched at the Evensong Service on Tuesday 25 November, led by Bishop Anna Eltringham, Bishop of Ripon (5.30 pm, followed by a reception). Everyone is welcome to join us, to meet representatives of the local aid agencies and to find out more about such an important part of our mission.

Information about and links to help agencies will be available in the Cathedral throughout the 16 Days. At the end of the period there will be a silent vigil at 10.00 am on Saturday 6 December, outside the West Door of the Cathedral, followed by a service at 10.30 am, open to all.






Canon Matthew to be the next Honorary Chaplain of the Yorkshire Agricultural Society

The start of the school year in September also brought a new start to Children's Church, as we relaunched with two distinctive groups: Mustard Seeds, for 0-6 year olds and their parents/carers; and Mighty Trees, for 7-11 year olds. Whilst Mighty Trees aims to provide a lively time of worship for older primary-school-aged children, with games and activities bookended with short prayers and rituals (such as the lighting of candles and sharing of the Peace), Mustard Seeds follows a different structure altogether, aimed specifically at younger children. Using songs and storytelling based on the Revd Dr Sharon Moughtin's "Diddy Disciples" material we have so much fun every week as we come together in worship to pray, give thanks, say sorry, get creative, and connect with each other and God. Some of our Mustard Seeds children (along with Canon Wendy) gave us a wonderful taster of this sung storytelling during our all-age Harvest Festival service on 5th October.

GROWING GREENER – RIPON CATHEDRAL ENVIRONMENT NEWS

REFLECTION ON CREATIONTIDE

Creationtide, when the church celebrates our wonderful sustaining world and reminds us of the fifth mark of mission 'to strive to safeguard the integrity of creation, and sustain and renew the life of the Earth' was wonderfully celebrated at Ripon Cathedral this year.

The hymns, readings, prayers, laments and inspiring sermons from Revd Marion Russell, Canon Michael and Canon Wendy, made this a special season of thoughtful and honest engagement with the climate and environmental crisis. It probably comforted those who already recognise the environmental crisis and made others grateful to hear this as the word of God.

RIPON TOGETHER GREEN FAIR – 11^{TH} OCTOBER IN ALLHALLOWGATE METHODIST CHURCH

33 different local organisations came together to showcase their work to make Ripon a greener and more sustainable place to live. Good conversations were had between over 200 members of the public and stall holders.

The Mayor of Ripon, Cllr Barbara Brodigan opened the fair and was introduced by Chair of the Ripon Youth Council, Zoe Ingham. Both made impassioned speeches about the climate crisis.

Six excellent talks were heard in the chapel

- Andy Brown, NY Councillor, Green Party member, talked about summer wildfires on the moors.
- Energy Oasis' Mike Kay's theme was 'Cut Costs, Cut Consumption, Cut Carbon.
- **Steve Hall**, from WT Hall Builders, explained energy saving improvements in homes.
- **Simon Warwick** talked about a new partnership to restore the Ripon's Quarry Moor SSI nature park.
- **Rebecca Cranlan** from the Green House, Ripon, explained ways we can reduce our carbon footprints
- **John Whitfield** explained practical ways to make Ripon city centre and routes to schools safer for pedestrians and cyclists using Ripon's LCWAIP Local Cycling, Walking, Accessibility Infrastructure Plan.

The Ripon Together Green Fair is the only event in ripon that recognises that we are living in a climate and environmental crisis and that makes it important.

ECO CHURCH, CHRISTIAN AID AND HEDGEHOGS AT THE GREEN FAIR

Ripon Cathedral was represented by Ros Swaney on an Eco Church stall. Dorothy Gray was on the Christian Aid stall selling pre-loved handbags, jewellery and scarves which made £90 for Christian Aid's Harvest Appeal. As well, a children's activity to



make a hedgehog was part of the Cathedral participation. Canon Matthew and Canon Wendy helped and had some good eco conversations with the stall holders and members of the public.

As winter approaches you may find a hedgehog which needs protection. I had an interesting conservation with Barbara Brodigan at the Green Fair and she agreed to share her story about helping a hedgehog in October 2024 — $Ros\ Swanev\ PEO$

HELPING HETTIE: A HEDGEHOG'S SECOND CHANCE by Cllr Barbara Brodigan, Mayor of Ripon "How one Yorkie made Ripon greener, one hedgehog at a time"



Last October, my Yorkshire terrier proved that heroes come in small, furry packages. While doing his usual garden patrol, he discovered a tiny baby hedgehog perched precariously on our cellar window ledge. The little hog—soon named *Hettie*—was only about four weeks old, far too young to brave the wild alone.

A quick call to the hedgehog rescue centre in York set her on the road to recovery. Declared healthy

but in need of warmth and care, she spent the winter there under expert supervision, with me as her proud sponsor and cheerleader. When Hettie woke from hibernation in spring, she came home to Ripon. Since then, she's enjoyed nightly meals of dried kitten food and has even moved into her own purpose-built hedgehog house—crafted to keep her cosy and safe this winter.

It's been a joy to see how a simple act of care can make a big difference. With a little help, even the smallest creatures can thrive—and our gardens can become true wildlife havens.




